

Rhonda Burchmore is one of Australia's most loved and best-known performers. She has forged an illustrious career spanning decade's, appeared on television as well as on the stage, recorded five albums, and won many awards.

From her humble beginnings growing up in Sydney to London's West End you would think that Rhonda had done it all. I was lucky enough to have a conversation with her a few weeks ago about her career, life and love of fishing, as well as finding out about her upcoming show ABBA-solutely Fabulous.

As a child growing up in Sydney Rhonda remembers it as a safe, loving environment. Her mother Yvonne would take them to the local dance school. Growing up was a whirl of dance, costumes, and singing. With a holiday house on the Sapphire Coast in NSW the scene was set for many amazing holidays. This was a chance for everybody to come together as a family and where Rhonda got her first taste of fishing.

With the death of her parents to Parkinson's disease and sister Michelle passing away in 2015 after a long battle with Multiple System Atrophy, Rhonda says, "Those years were extremely hard to get through, it certainly made me thank and respect how great my family life was. Not a day goes by when I don't think of them all."

Rhonda first met the talented Lara Mulcahy in 2001 when they performed together in the original Australian production of the hit musical Mama Mia and says, "Lara has been the best medicine for me, she has helped me heal from so much tragedy."

In fact, they both connected and became the best of friends who incidentally, both share the same sense of humour.

Their upcoming show ABBA-solutely Fabulous is full of fun and craziness and has received extraordinary reviews. It has been forty years since ABBA performed in Australia.

The show is about two Australian girls that never got to see the performance way back then, so they tell their own story with approximately twenty-four songs. Rhonda says, "We don't imitate ABBA, but we celebrate the seventies and ABBA's music."

There are some quick costume changes throughout the performance with the obligatory catsuits and platform shoes, along with a few surprises. Rhonda says, "Our young, purposefully picked, hot boys

in the show are wearing shorts, sequins and knee-high white socks, they absolutely love the fun of it all, besides they get to see us oldies dancing."

Produced by Rhonda Burchmore herself the show only took two days to write and was done on the lounge room floor. Rhonda says, "We know each other so well, we had an idea of what we wanted to do so got together talked, listened to the songs and bounced ideas off each other

"We found that we had a lot of similar experiences growing up, so we could draw from those. All our childhood memories from the seventies came spilling out".

Rhonda's special message to YOU.

We are really looking forward to performing on the Fraser Coast.

ABBA-solutely Fabulous is all about friendship, girl power, and lycra. Come to the show and forget all your troubles. It is the ultimate girls and guys night out.

We look forward to doing a meet and greet after the show for a selfie or a little chat. It is always great to see the faces of the many locals.

I simply could not let Rhonda go without asking her about her passion for fishing which began on the Sapphire Coast in NSW on those family holidays.

So, for a bit of fun, here are Rhonda's top five fishing tips:

- 1 Do a pipi dance at the right tide. This is also a good exfoliator for your feet and don't forget to shake your booty.
- 2 When you throw your line out sing sea shanties to the fish to get the best results.
- 3 If you fish at sunset watch out for the old sharkies so don't venture out into the ocean to far at that time.
- 4 Always chat up the locals about the best fishing spots.
- 5 Don't forget to kiss your fish then release if you are not planning on eating it. Give it a good send off.

LINES IN THE SAND IS BACK!

William McInnes, one of Australia's most critically acclaimed all-round actors and author of five best-selling books, will feature along with other notable authors at this year's Lines in the Sand Readers and Writers Festival in Hervey Bay from September 14 to 16.

"The festival is a great opportunity to bring some of the best Australian writers and thinkers to the region," Culture, Arts and Environment Portfolio Councillor David Lewis said.

"It will be interesting to hear what they have to say and discuss issues and writing with them."

During the festival, aspiring and published authors from the region can attend a mixture of free and paid workshops, lectures, meet and greets and book signings.

"There are many book clubs on the Fraser Coast, as well as aspiring writers, self-published and published authors," Cr Lewis said.

"Lines in the Sand will bring all kinds of writers together to talk with each other about styles, share ideas and discuss publishing.

"To be able to meet professional writers and talk about their craft is a great opportunity."

Cr Lewis said the festival was not just for writers.

"There will also be lectures by the managing director of Boolorong Press, Dan Kelly, on how to be published, and plenty of opportunities for readers to enjoy themselves."

While the lectures will be free, there is a small cost for some of the workshops. Spaces at the lectures and workshops are limited so bookings are essential.





We really are spoilt for choice here on the Fraser Coast, school holidays can be so much fun. You can spend the days relaxing, or find an adventure, and all without spending very much, all you have to do is to put one foot in front of the other, open the door and step outside.

BIRD WATCHING – Grab a pair of binoculars and a camera and identify as many bird species as you can. You will find our feathered friends in the trees, the undergrowth, the beach and on the ocean. Did you know that approximately three hundred birds have been identified within the Fraser Coast? Keep an eye out for rare birds such as the Crimson Rosella, or the Russet-tailed Thrush.

CAMPING/FISHING – We have the most gorgeous camping spots, it is hard to pick just a couple. Lake Lenthall is located 20km north west of Maryborough and is stocked with barramundi, yellow belly and bass and is a great location for camping, or for the perfect escape why not head to the beautiful Poona

located 35km south of Maryborough.

A DAY AT THE PARK - Take your pick of parks littered throughout the Fraser Coast. Grab a frisbee, your favourite book or a ball, take a walk and just soak up the rays, Oh and don't forget the picnic basket, this is a perfect day out for friends and family.

HEAD TO THE BEACH – Yes that's right, it may be winter but here on the Fraser Coast the beach is usually still nice and warm, so take an umbrella, some sunscreen, your bathers and that cricket set. Explore the rocks or identify the different seashells and make a day of it.

50 FOR A BIKE RIDE - There are lots of paths and trails to explore, stop at one of the takeaways or grab an ice cream, or better still pack a picnic lunch and explore. In Hervey Bay you have the length of the Esplanade and the mobility corridor to choose from. If bike riding is not your thing try skateboarding, rollerblading or roller-skating.

IOKING INTO THE BLUE

This exhibition is a continuation of artworks showcasing our great diverse coastline.

Following up from my two previous Regional exhibitions; Blue Vista 2012-2013 Gatakers Art space Maryborough and A Touch of Blue 2009 The Palace, Regional Gallery Childers

Showcasing artworks of the Fraser Coast, Fraser Island and surrounding coastlines. I have taken inspiring images on my camera that I have now recreated into artworks using traditional oil paints, depicting the simplicity of beauty in our native land and sea scapes. This is a collaboration of artworks that I have created in the last few years.

Our world heritage listed Fraser Island, offers a true diversity of stunning white beaches, coloured sands and diverse vegetation. Rainbow beach, Bargara, 1770 and our own Hervey Bay beaches, harbour, pier and surrounding coastlines also offer inspiration for painting.

Sharing these artworks enables people to see themselves in my paintings, reflecting their own stories and memories. People's lives are essentially very similar, they move forward making different tracks but our feelings and emotions can be the same.

Having grown up on a country farm beside the Condamine River, Artistic elements relating to the landscape were formed from a lifetime of memories from childhood. The life within the landscape, the luminance of colour and play of light, all influences the way I paint.

With an interest in artwork starting back twenty-five years ago, I fell in love with 'oils'. Over the years my style and techniques have matured, including lots of spatula work.

HEALTH TIPS FOR THE FRASER COAST COMMUNITY WITH DR MIKHAIL MASTAKOV

What is bariatric surgery?

Bariatric surgery is the most effective way to achieve a sustainable loss of excess body weight and control obesity associated medical conditions. It is performed only when the patient has tried all other non-surgical alternatives.

What are the benefits of bariatric surgery?

Patients are able to achieve a better quality of life. They can reduce their risk of heart disease or stroke, and they often find that they can become more active in their daily life and with the community. Bariatric surgery isn't for everyone, but if people have a BMI of over 35, high blood pressure or cholesterol, sleep apnoea or type 2 diabetes, this is a safe way to address these important issues.

What are the most common types of bariatric surgery?

Gastric bypass and sleeve gastrectomy are the most common and effective surgeries available. Sleeve gastrectomy is the most popular in Australia. This surgery allows us to create a narrow gastric tube and dramatically reduce the amount of food a person can eat at once. It also alters appetite. You eat much less while still enjoying your food and feel less hungry between meals.

What are some of the risks associated with this kind of surgery?

The sleeve gastrectomy is the less technical procedure and the safest. Some rare complications can be a bleeding or leaking of the suture line, or a stenosis or stricture that may cause a narrowing of the stomach entrance.

It is important to keep in mind that thousands of these operations have been performed and the complication rate is as low as 1-3%, so it can be compared to a gall bladder operation.

What are some of the lifestyle changes that patients need to make after surgery?

After surgery the patient's diet will change as they will be only able to consume small quantities of food. They will learn how to eat differently, to take things slow and to have smaller bites. You will also be unable to eat and drink at the same time.

It is not just the diet that will need to change though, the patient will need to change their whole lifestyle as surgery only does half of the work. Regular exercising and giving up smoking are also recommended. These changes are not made for only a few weeks or a few months but are made for life.

After surgery the patient will lose excess weight and be able to enjoy life once again.

What is the recovery time after surgery?

After having a sleeve gastrectomy, the recovery is expected to be quick. The patient will be in intensive care overnight and then will spend one or two days on a general ward before being discharged. We would usually recommend that you have two weeks off work. As it is keyhole surgery you are not expected to be in a lot of pain. You may feel tired, but every day you will improve.



What would be your advice to a patient experiencing anxiety and fear before surgery?

If you are feeling any excessive anxiety and fear before surgery we recommend that you visit your GP, psychologist or psychiatrist to address all issues.

Bariatric surgery involves a multidisciplinary team with the dietician being the main port of call before and after surgery. We usually recommend that you see a psychologist once before and two to three times after surgery.

For general, natural anxiety and fear we can assist you by offering reassurance as we explain all facets of the procedure to you.

What are your top five tips when talking about alternatives to surgery?

- Don't think that surgery is the Holy Grail, remember it is the last resort.
- Once you have thought seriously about weight loss, do it in a support group.
- 3. See your GP, dietician or psychologist to see how they can help
- 4. If you have decided to lose weight keep in mind that this is not a twenty-eight day or two-month diet, this is a serious lifestyle change that is for ever.
- As it is a lifestyle change you will also need to look at making healthy choices with diet and exercise for the entire family, developing good habits and sticking to them.

What started, as a student project by TAFE students has become one of Australia's favourite open water swims that still attracts swimmers to Hervey Bay to swim the iconic event.

The Hervey Bay version of the Pier 2 Pub may never top the famous Lorne Pier 2 Pub with over 5000 swimmers, but the Hervey Bay version has its own fans that keep coming back year after year to swim with the tide and go for the ride!

Hervey Surf Lifesaving Club took over the management of the event many years ago and have been making sure swimmers return every year to enjoy the swim and visit Hervey Bay.

The Torquay Hotel Pier 2 Pub was traditionally held in April for the first part of its life but the decision was made to move the event to September to be held the same weekend as the Hervey Bay Masters Surf Life Saving Carnival before the Surf Life Saving patrolling season starts.

Over the years the swim has attracted swimmers from all walks of life and all abilities with many budding open water swimmers selecting the event for their first splash in the open water.

Hervey Surf Lifesaving Club president Darren Everard said, "one of the highlights of the swim is the first timers who visit to do our swim, we have a joke with them about there being no black lines on the bottom of the sea"

"This year we have a local swimmer who is swimming in her first open water swim and we have been joking with her for a few years about having her first splash in an open water race. Seeing a person tackle their fears and complete the swim is an amazing experience; seeing the pre-race fear and the smile on their faces when they pop up at the finish line makes the effort of managing the swim all worthwhile" Everard said.

Hervey Surf Lifesaving Club is known for supplying quality water safety for events in Hervey Bay for many years and the Torquay Hotel Pier 2 Pub is no exception.

The event has three swims on the day with a swim for everybody from beginners to experienced swimmers. Many swimmers use the Hervey Bay swim as a stepping-stone to other swims. We have swimmers use our swim as a tune up for their Olympic campaign and English Channel swims, Club Captain Darren Horton said. "We have a set of guidelines that we follow to ensure we supply a safe swim that will require a united club effort to supply the coverage required, it is really a case of all hands on deck with around 30 club members on duty for the event" Horton said.

One of the highlights of the event over the years was a moment when Australian Paralympian Brenden Hall and Jack Burnham came out of the water in 2013. There was one second separating the first three with Brenden coming third.

Last year's winners, Hayden Cotter and sister Jamie achieved great times with Hayden coming in at 32:57 and Jamie in at 39:14, In the 3.1km the last swimmer was back in just over an hour.

The swimmer to draw the biggest crowd to the event was former PM Tony Abbot in 2012 who was invited by the club to join in.

Club Publicity Officer Phil Munson said "Mr Abbot competed in the 1600 metre race that we had at the time and was back in around thirty-three odd minutes. We would love to have him back to do the swim as it created a lot of interest in our event"

We encourage anybody who is interested in open water swimming to come down to the club on a Saturday afternoon and have a talk with the community swimming group that swims from the club at 3.30pm every Saturday or join them as this is a great way to get involved and it is free." Munson said.

Both you and your brother John have been with the Angels since the very beginning in 1970. As a band what is the secret to your longevity?

We often say it is all about the riffs and the melodies. The songs have proven themselves to still be relevant today, as a songwriter this is very rewarding.

This tour celebrates the 40th anniversary of the album Face II Face, first released in 1978. What is it about this album that still resonates today?

It is hard to define. Why do people still like to play Jimmy Hendricks and many others. Nowadays there are lots of disposable acts, we never wanted to be disposable. We also never wanted to copy other acts we wanted them to copy us. I think that we achieved that.

I understand that Face II Face has been completely rerecorded for 2018, what adaptations or sounds have been added, how does this album differ from the original?

There are plenty of subtle differences, different amps, different quitars.

The guitar I used in the original recording was stolen in 1980 while on tour, along with all the rest of the bands equipment. The truck was found at the bottom of Lake Michigan in Chicago. When the truck was recovered all that it contained was a bag of dirty washing that belonged to our sound engineer at the time.

It's a different band, but the same songs. We wanted to re-record this album to include all our current band members and allow them a sense of ownership.

A limited-edition double CD will be available at the gig. Tell us a bit more about these?

The studio recording took two days with all the same arguments that we had forty years ago.

The album is selling well. It is great to have a version of the concert that they will have just seen, for sale. Down the track we may look at releasing a music DVD of the concert.

Your first ever hit single was 'Take a Long Line' produced in 1978. Where did the inspiration come from for this song?

The idea came from a riff that I played at Checkers Nightclub in Sydney. We would play about five sets and finish at about three in the morning. The band would get paid a hundred dollars a night.

Quite often that is how it evolves, stumbling on something that sounds good and bringing it to life.

I read that you trained as a classical pianist in your youth. Do you still play? What made you choose the guitar in the band?

I love the piano and still play, it is a beautiful instrument. I have a fifteen and a thirteen-year-old learning piano at the moment.

All I knew about guitar then were the basic cords. When we started the rock band I wanted more control over the sound and the melodies which is why I play the guitar.


My brother John and I have a duo called Brewster Brothers, hardly original I know but we play often, I get to play the keyboard and piano which I always enjoy.

I also read that you are a keen photographer, what camera do you use currently and what do you most like to photograph?

My first camera was a Nikkormat, it was fully manual and only used film. I was invited to go to a photographer's studio who ended up teaching me everything I needed to know, I learnt about darkrooms and processing. When in Sydney I would photograph King's Cross and the interesting characters on the street. I have done a few album covers for the Angels. I find photography therapeutic. Anything creative is satisfying and incredibly rewarding.

I am also building an electric guitar as I have always liked working with wood. It has taken a few months so far and will take a few more months before it is finished. Then if it sounds ok I will play it at a gig.

When performing at various venues Daniel gets asked regularly to sing Johnny Cash songs due to his deep, sultry voice, he always obliges.

Growing up in the Thompson household with both parent's musicians, meant that the house was always filled with a wide variety of music, everything from The Beetles to the Rolling Stones and of course Johnny Cash and country music was thrown into the mix. Daniel says, "Back then it was just music to me. As I grew older, songs that told a story began to appeal to me, I found that most country music did exactly that."

Daniel says, "It was that popular that we did it the next night, then the next night and it literally snowballed from there."

I noticed that he would hold his guitar high, with his shoulders high, it changes the way that you feel and the way that you sing.

If I would have had the opportunity to meet Johnny Cash before he died I would have said thanks for the amazing music, thank you for being so open and honest in life and for sharing it with all of us."

Johnny Cash the Concert pays tribute to the man in black in the best way possible. The audience will get to see a glimpse of what it would have been like to see a Johnny Cash concert for real. You will also see the whole of the Folsom Prison album performed as well as many other hits during the stars long career.

Daniel says, "I am also thrilled that we have the beautiful Rebecca Lee Nye along as well. Rebecca sings as June Carter Cash in a few songs, she is from Queensland and a successful singer in her own right.



To date I have written about thirty songs, out of that thirty I have about five that I am proud of.

My songs are a reflection on life events. Sometimes the words may come to me and I write then down, then I work on the music. It can be the other way around as well though.

Have you released any albums?

Not yet, later this year through uni we get to record an EP and release it. I am very excited about this. For me it will mean that I can call myself an actual artist, not just a cover artist. Hopefully I will get it on Spotify and Itunes and have copies to sell at gigs.

Where would you like to see yourself in the future?

I am currently at Uni completing a bachelor's degree at JCM Academy, studying contemporary music and performance. In the future I would like to have a larger fanbase and hope that fans can relate to my music and enjoy it. I have been a soloist for three years now but wouldn't rule out working with a band one day, that would be cool. I would also like to bring out some music videos one day.

At eighteen years of age, musician Harley Meszaros has lots of experience under his belt. He has been performing for three years around our region and has been getting his name out there to all those that count. He is humble, with the world at his feet. Harley Meszaros is definitely one to watch out for in the future.

As a soloist you play around the Fraser Coast and Bundaberg area, how many gigs would you do a vear?

I would probably do between forty to fifty a year. I can sometimes do up to three a week. I am always looking to spread myself out over other areas as well, including Brisbane.

What kind of music do you play and why:

I mainly play pop rock, at the venues I like to play classic aussie pub songs to get the audience involved. One of my favourite songs that I like to play is Never Tear Us Apart by INXS. I also play covers from Ed Sheeran, John Mayer, Mumford & Sons and Gang of Youths.







