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
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Les Ballets Eloelle's Men in Pink Tights promises to entertain all those who go to see the show. With some great choreography, gorgeous costumes and lots of laughs it is a winner all the way.

Ballet Director, Victor Hugo Trevino was in Florida at the time of this interview but kindly answered a few questions for me. - Kim, Editor.

Tell us a bit about your background — Where were you born, where did you grow up and what was your childhood like?

I was born in a small city in Utah. My parents were migrant farm workers and then they became entrepreneurs and business owners. I came from a big family and I was the youngest child, so you can imagine I used humor to get myself out of a lot of situations with my older siblings. I grew up working in my parent's country store and a small restaurant they had. I didn't learn about ballet until I was in college at the University of Florida, where I was a business major. I always enjoyed learning and was good with math and sciences. I assumed I would one day work in my father's business, so dance shook up my future and made my father very unhappy. It took him many years of me working professionally and traveling globally before he finally stopped asking me when I would get a real job.

Tell us a little about Les Ballets Eloelle?

Ballet Eloelle (LOL) is a comedic all male classical and contemporary dance company. I was asked to form a company in 1996 for the purpose of touring Japan. That company was called Ballets Grandiva, Men in Tutus. The company was featured in many magazines and television shows and had fantastic reviews in many papers. In 2009 my mother starting getting ill and I felt I needed a break from touring and dancing. Grandiva continued without me for a few seasons, but then began to fall apart. Mark Rafter contacted me and asked if I would tour Australia and New Zealand with a group. I took that opportunity to rework and tighten up the show and the concept of the show. We did over a hundred performances under our new name and got back to our comedic roots. The show now is a great balance of comedy and dancing.

Tell us a bit about the costumes and the makeup for Men in Pink Tights

As you can imagine, it is not easy to find tutus for the male body. All the costumes are handmade and designed by top costume designers. The beading and feathers are all done by hand. I thought it was important to hire costumers who worked with the big companies, like the American Ballet Theater. In fact some of our costumes look almost exactly alike. In several instances, our costumes were made to look like theirs, but in a few instances, the designer made ours first and then I would see the same designs on world class ballerinas. The make-up is stylized, but beyond that, every dancer creates their own look. There are only a few restrictions. They must wear wigs and their faces must pop on stage.

What is the one question that you wish Reporters would ask — and stop asking?

I really don't mind answering any questions, but NO, my eyelashes are not heavy. I appreciate reporters who have an understanding of dance and do not reduce what we do down to wearing women's attire. Most reporters though are pretty good about asking questions relating to dance, gender, culture and comedy and how those things can come together and have a commonality with the general public. I guess the question I enjoy answering is how a non dance audience responds and identifies with the humor in the show across so many cultures. I like to think of us as ambassadors that can help bridge cultures through laughter.

What can the audience expect if they come to see your show?

I think they should expect the unexpected. I think many people come to the show expecting it to be a simple dance show with men doing a lot of slapstick humor and dancing poorly on their toes. While there might be a touch of that for a few laughs, overall, the show will surprise you. We have performed this show on five continents, soon to be six. It is a unique show with unique personalities. I think the most unexpected thing they might see onstage is the recognition of how those unique personalities onstage remind them of either themselves or people they know, or situations they have experienced. Our audiences hopefully leave with a smile on their face and a memory of a bunch of odd ballerinas that they identify with much more than they might have expected.

2018 has been an exceptional year for close encounters with our Humpback Whale visitors both early in the season with the juveniles and sub-adults as well as recently with the mums and calves.

A particularly special moment was when a mother carried her calf on her head towards the port bow of the boat getting to a metre from the boat and then slowly passing the length of the boat as if to show off her beautiful offspring to all the passengers onboard Freedom III. This even gave the skipper goosebumps. Close encounters with mums and calves is not something you see often but this year the whales seem to be more accepting of the boats and willing to share their calves with us.

We have been blessed with great weather, happy visitors and more whales than ever before. We even had two Southern Right whales and a calf for over a month early in the season as well. Breaching has been seen almost every day during our full day tour. The juvenile whales early in the season were particularly adventurous and active and often came in to "mug" the boat, sometimes for an hour or more.

Our first whale watch season has come to a close and what a ride it has been! We had to pinch ourselves so many times to believe we were running Whalesong. We're in such a privileged position of being able to showcase our backyard and these incredible creatures to people from all over the world. It's been very busy and as we wind down, we're preparing for next season already.

We have many special memories so it's hard to pick just one. Of course, nothing beats your first whale encounters of the season. Having said that, August was an absolute delight with the juveniles mugging the boat and putting on a great show for our guests. On one particular occasion, we had 3 whales with their heads poking out of the water watching us all for at least 8 minutes; an extended spy hop. Just simply hanging out watching us. They were as intrigued with us as we were with them. It gave us a true sense of their intelligence and curiosity. A connection like that leaves a lasting impression in your mind and your heart. We're so fortunate to have had many encounters like this throughout the season.

Rebecca Greenshields – Whalesong Cruises Hervey Bay

The 2018 whale watch season has been an outstanding opportunity for Pacific Whale Foundation Australia to advance our mission to protect the oceans through science and advocacy and inspire environmental stewardship. Our unique whale watch boat, Ocean Defender, allows us to educate tourists, collect research data, and promote ocean conservation. In addition to observing humpback whales on every trip since the season started, we have seen right whale mothers and calves, pods of bottlenose and Australian humpback dolphins, dugongs, and sea turtles. Our humpback whale research, ongoing in Queensland since 1984, continues to uncover critical details about the abundance, migratory characteristics, and social behaviors of this amazing species. We are also looking at residency patterns of mothers and calves in Platypus Bay, a critical resting place on the long journey back to the Antarctic. This year we initiated a study of the impacts of swimming with whales on normal humpback behavior. Our certified naturalists offered educational programs for the public at a number of venues in the community, and our research staff presented public talks and conducted a successful beach cleanup with local volunteers. Hervey Bay remains the best place in the world for observing humpback whales.



The National Rodeo Association (NRA) National Finals Rodeo (NFR) returns to the Fraser Coast for another year at the Maryborough Showgrounds and Equestrian Park on Saturday 10 November 2018 and the competitors are turning pink in support of breast cancer awareness.

The NFR showcases the NRA's best cowboys, cowgirls, juniors and livestock. Each November the top twelve contestants in the Bull Ride, Saddle Ride, Bareback Ride, Steer Wrestling, Rope and Tie, Team Roping, Barrel Race, Breakaway Roping, Steer Undecorating, U18 Junior Bull Ride, U18 Junior Barrel Race, U18 Junior Breakaway Roping, U15 Junior Steer Ride and U12 Poddy Ride qualify to compete at the NFR. Qualification is based on season points from the NRA standings for that year.

Tough Enough To Wear Pink provides a nationallyrecognised campaign and framework for rodeos and western events to promote breast cancer awareness and fundraising to benefit their local communities. Pink is not a colour usually associated with the tough sport of rodeo however breast cancer has touched the lives of many rodeo and western lifestyle families and the National Rodeo Association want to put this important health issue top-of-mind at our NFR.

The Ute Muster brings the usual class competitions as well as some Timed Event Trials, novelty events and prizes. Placegetters in the Ute Muster Classes will enter into the Near North Sub Chamber finals and then onto the Ekka. Please note that there is a zero tolerance for alcohol if you want to be part of the Ute Muster.

Afternoon entertainment includes live music by Unfinished Business, a Jumping Castle, Face Painting and Ute Muster events. Food vendors and liquor licence will add to the atmosphere so NO BYO. We will have Security on the

Gates open at midday to check out the Utes and afternoon entertainment.



If you were to ask Heather Sugget if she sees herself as 'inspirational' she would probably smile and say something like 'so many people in our community do so much. I'm just trying to pull things together.'

Heather was born and raised in Lakes Entrance in Western Australia. She credits her mother with honing her interest in working to support others. 'Mom was always working for school and community events, projects and activities. She never seemed to stop'

Heather's first voluntary role 'in her own right' was with the 'Surf Lifesaving Club' at Lakes Entrance. 'I loved making a difference', she said.

Heather and her husband Brett moved to Hervey Bay just over eleven years ago. Together they own a small business, Scooters & Mobility. Heather is also a nurse at the local hospital.


Heather has two children, a boy and a girl. As the family grew up, Heather's voluntary roles in the community changed. She has been a Brownie Leader, hosted foreign students on the AFS Exchange program and six years ago, Heather became a member of the Rotary Club of Hervey Bay Sunrise. In 2016/17, Heather served a Presidential year with the Club. Heather is keenly interested in the welfare of children, is an active 'host parent' for youth exchange and serves on the District Committee supporting programs for young people.

In 2016, through her involvement with Rotary, Heather first learned about 'Days for Girls', a global movement that prepares and distributes sustainable menstrual health solutions to girls who would otherwise miss school during their monthly periods. After completing a very busy year as President, Heather felt she needed 'something else to do.' 'Days for Girls' soon became Heather's passion. Raising funds, soliciting donations of goods and mobilizing an army of more than forty 'sewing ladies', Heather's crew have completed more than 500 sanitation kits that have been distributed to Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands, Cambodia, and African countries. She stressed that all this work could not be done without the support of the sewing circles at RV Homebase, the Baptist Church and the Howard Community Centre. But all the while Heather is there, collecting sewing, organising materials, planning sewing days and packing up the 'Days for Girls' kits.

When asked why Heather is so committed to and fully engaged in community work, her response was both simple and profound. I get a sense of fulfilment making a difference for other people, said Heather. I feel better knowing that young people in particular will have a better opportunity because of something I have done.'

Heather Sugget is just one of those that 'Inspire Us' in the Fraser Coast. So many do so much! It is truly inspiring to know we live in community where so many make a difference!

HEALTH TIPS FOR THE FRASER COAST COMMUNITY

WITH DR REGINA WULF

What is a gynaecologist?

A gynaecologist is a medical doctor specialising in women's reproductive systems. This can include the treatment of hormonal problems, infertility, pelvic disorders such as abnormal bleeding, ovarian, uterine or cervical pathology, as well as prolapse or the management of incontinence.

Why have you chosen this field of specialty?

I enjoy working with women as I can relate to their problems and worries. Gynaecology is very versatile including knowledge in Endocrinology, Urology, General Medicine as well as being an operative specialty. I always wanted to empower women to seek help and make positive changes in their lives, which this specialty has enabled me to do. I have developed a special interest in surgery, in particular laparoscopic (key-hole surgery) and pelvic floor reconstruction, and I also diagnose and treat women with urinary incontinence, which is extremely rewarding.

What are the more common reasons to visit a gynaecologist?

This depends on the age of the population. For example, in Darwin, where I worked before moving to Hervey Bay, I diagnosed and treated many women with infertility, endometriosis, dysfunctional uterine bleeding and cervical pathology. Here in Hervey Bay, I commonly treat women with postmenopausal bleeding, incontinence and pelvic floor prolapse.

How do you put your patient at ease?

I always greet my patient with a smile and introduce myself. I believe comfortable and relaxed surroundings are also of great importance. I listen to my patient's concerns and problems with full attention, usually only writing notes after the conclusion of the visit if possible. Another important factor is to give adequate time.

What are some of the minor surgeries performed?

Hysteroscopy D&C, for postmenopausal or abnormal uterine bleeding, is a procedure were a telescope is inserted into the uterine cavity to inspect the lining. A biopsy of the lining is usually taken at the same time. We also perform a diagnostic laparoscopy for pelvic pain and infertility. LLETZ (large loop excision of the transformation zone) is a minimal invasive procedure were previously detected abnormal cells are removed from the cervix.



Can lifestyle affect any of the conditions you treat?

Obesity can affect a woman's reproductive system. If a woman wants to become pregnant she increases her risk of infertility, miscarriage and diabetes in pregnancy if she is obese. In later life she increases her risk of uterine cancer by over 50%. With the increased abdominal pressure, incontinence and uterine or vagina prolapse also become a significant risk.

Do women need to see a gynaecologist annually?

There is rarely a need to see a gynaecologist on an annual basis as cervical screening and health checks are usually performed by a general practitioner. If a woman has seen a gynaecologist and a follow up visit has been recommended then the appointment should be kept as further specialist management is needed.

A Dawn with no

Tony Matthews

NOVEMBER 11 THIS YEAR MARKS THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE END OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR BUT ONE OF THE LEAST KNOWN ASPECTS OF THE WAR IS THAT A TOTAL OF 121 MEN SERVING IN AUSTRALIAN MILITARY FORCES WERE SENTENCED TO DEATH DURING THE CONFLICT. MANY OF THEM JUST COUNTRY LADS WHO HAD **VOLUNTEERED FOR SERVICE WITHOUT REALLY KNOWING WHAT THEY** WERE LETTING THEMSELVES IN FOR.

Not one of these men was actually executed but a powerful new novel by a Queensland author brings the brutal system of British battlefield 'justice' sharply into focus. A Dawn with no Birdsong by Tony Matthews delves deeply into one of the most controversial aspects of the First World War — the policy of the British military in executing its own men, and those of its allied forces, for misdemeanors such as sleeping at a post, shell-shock, striking an officer, and other similar 'The injustice involved in almost all these cases is something which has always been of keen interest to me,' Tony said recently, 'the courage, resilience and suffering of those very ordinary men who volunteered, or were conscripted, to fight and often to die during that terrible conflict. Generally speaking they didn't want to be there but were forced to fight and die through the fear of brutal punishments which were being imposed by the British military authorities and government including crucifixion to wagon wheels and execution by firing


Desertion, quitting a post, cowardice, disobedience, striking an officer, casting away arms, mutiny and sleeping while on duty, were all crimes punishable by death. During the four years of war a total of 346 men were executed by British firing squads for just such offences. The statistics are horrendous. One soldier was being executed by firing squad approximately every four days for the entire period of the war. The Australian Government during the First World War banned the use of capital punishment and no Australians were executed with the exception of two who were serving with the New Zealand forces and one man who had been serving with a South African division. 'A Dawn with no Birdsong is a novel,' Tony says, 'but it is also an examination and, I hope, a powerful indictment of the British military system of field punishment at that time.

I wrote A Dawn with no Birdsong as a tribute to all those soldiers who were killed unnecessarily by their British masters.' In 2001 the poignant 'Shot at Dawn Memorial' to the executed men was unveiled at Alre was, Staffordshire, England. It is a stark memorial depicting a statue, some eight feet in height, of a blindfolded soldier standing waiting to be shot. The statue, created by British sculptor Andy DeComyn, is situated on the eastern side of the memorial where the sun first rises. More than three hundred wooden stakes lie behind and beside the main statue, depicting each of the men who were 'shot at dawn' and subsequently pardoned. Some of the victims were as young as seventeen years. Most of the executed men were pardoned posthumously by the British Government but for many decades the families of those soldiers had been forced to live with the shame and ignominy. Additionally, the men who had been forced to form the firing squads also had to live with their actions, and the guilt never left them. Some in later life committed suicide. Tony Matthews is the author of thirty published books. He lives with his wife, Lensie, at Hervey Bay, Queensland.

How did you get the gig in the Kimberley?

I rolled in to Lake Argyle in the East Kimberley and stayed for one night, then two, then a week, which turned into a month, which turned into another month and the rest is history. I perform at Lake Argyle Resort six nights a week from April to September during the dry season. The weather is perfect for performing outdoors and the people are down to earth, lively and interesting. There is definitely something spiritual about the place too. You can live simply and feel free to be yourself.

You mentioned that you would like some local gigs over spring/ summer, tell us about your music?

Music-wise I play a bit of everything, it all depends on the audience. I sing everything from folk to country, pop, blues, rock and a bit of hip-hop. I guess my music is easy listening, I am there with my guitar, harmonica, foot tambourine and stomp box at my feet. It is just me, my personality and the music that people enjoy listening to.

Do you have any albums out, if so what are they called and tell us a little about them?

I have a double album out, the first disc is a compilation called 'Living the Dream', which is a selection of my own songs. The second disc is called 'Live at the Lake' and features some of my live cover songs. My current single 'Man In A Van' was recorded locally with Rob Mackay and includes a music video filmed and edited right here in Hervey Bay.

Tell us a little about your childhood?

I was born and bred in Wagga Wagga, I had a great childhood but funnily enough when I got to high school I was so intimidated by the other musicians in the music class that I ended up dropping it for biology instead. It wasn't until my early 20's that I took up the guitar again and that's when things started happening for me. My Mum and Dad have always been very supportive of me over the years. I also have a younger sister who is a school teacher, she is currently off volunteering at an orphanage in Peru.




How do you make music?



FROM THE DIRECTOR

Australian Gothic theatre is a uniquely Australian style of drama. It often evokes the isolated landscape of the Australian bush and the paranormal while probing into the dark corners of our history and culture to tell important – often Indigenous - stories that have never been told.

This play was born in the era of the Port Arthur massacre when the nation was shocked by the events and images of a chilling act of horror - all perpetrated by a young, blonde Tasmanian man. Who knew evil could look so innocent? From this crucible of shock and fear – Wolf Lullaby emerged [the Arts to the rescue] to help the nation digest what had happened and to think about the future by taking a long, hard look at itself. This play asks the question: how did he get to this point? Is someone born evil – is it genetic? Or does the wider culture bear some responsibility?

Australian Gothic Theatre is a mixture of modern and post-modern styles of drama. It mixes a realistic style of action with and against a sparse style of set (to stand in for many locations). It mixes the dream-like and the real, often using lighting and projections. It has been my pleasure

and joy to work with this dedicated group of creatives: designers and actors, technical crew and production team, to bring this play to the Z-PAC stage.

THE STORY

This play is a classic of the Australian Gothic style. It takes place in a remote town in Tasmania where a baby boy is found murdered. It is the story about the lives of those caught up within the harrowing murder investigation.

Lizzie is 9 years old and horrifyingly, the main suspect of the crime. Angela, Lizzie's mother, is tortured by the untenable possibility that Sergeant Ray Armstrong's suspicions are correct and that her little girl could be capable of such an act. But there is reason to believe that Lizzie is guilty, after all, she is haunted, like her mother before her, of the dark and the wolf who visits bringing menace, evil and palpable fear.

Lizzie's father, Warren, is also haunted, but not by a wolf, rather the horrific accusations against his only child. His world also collapses about him as he navigates blindly between denial and disbelief of all that is happening.

Wolf Lullaby tackles the untenable reality that sometimes even children are capable of being murderers. But, the play does not position its audience to blindly accept Lizzie's innocence or guilt. It pushes us to consider why a child might murder, and as a society, have we somehow contributed to this tragedy? How should we view this? What should be done? It asks the audience to consider how close many of us, at sometime, tread the line between breakdown and break through. What 'saves' most of us from stepping across that line: chance, upbringing, luck, moral boundaries, faith?

The play also examines the concept of 'truth' and the various versions of it. Where is the line between 'knowing the truth' and being broken and/ or breaking others by it? Even if there are no answers to the questions raised in Wolf Lullaby, Bell asks for self-examination, for each of us to look within.

Things moved incredibly quickly for Melbourne rockers Massive after forming in Mid 2012. Within 6 months, they'd performed a number of showcase gigs in the USA, signed with management company Third Verse & were on the eve of completing their critically acclaimed debut album.

In 2013 the band took to the road supporting Glenn Hughes, Lita Ford and Australian heavyweights The Screaming Jets. The band signed a multi album worldwide deal with Earache records and immediately made plans to take their brand of rock n roll to the world.

Before too long, the full length debut album was front and center on the cover of Classic Rock Magazine. Billboards lit up the M4 motorway in London and press and media were repeatedly referring to Massive as 'the next big rock act to emerge from Australia' pegging Massive alongside, Airborne, ACDC and some of Australia's finest.

2014 finished with Massive spending 6 weeks on the road in the UK and Europe wowing audiences whilst performing as special guests of The Treatment & USAs Blackberry Smoke. 35 shows in total, tens of thousands of kilometres and unquantifiable amounts of beer. Massive are road dogs in the true sense of the term and enjoy nothing more than being on the road and playing every venue they can.

In 2016 the band released their 2nd full length record "Destination Somewhere" which again received worldwide praise. It reached 33 in the UK rock charts and 19 in the Australian independent charts. In late 2016 the band announced they were taking on their first headline tour of Europe. 40 shows including a main stage appearance at Hard Rock Hell Festival.

Having hardly refilled the tank, Massive again jumped in the van in mid 2017, supporting Living Colour around Australia, then smashing head first into the UK summer festival scene playing alongside heavyweights ZZ Top, Rainbow, Extreme; Rival Sons and more. As a sign of the bands intent to never slow down they somehow managed time to record their 3rd studio album titled "Rebuild Destroy" due for release mid 2018 along with the bands biggest tour to date crossing Australia, Asia, Europe and UK.




























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
