



to Rock By The C

When you have a headline act such as Jimmy Barnes, you know that all of your rock and roll dreams are about to come true. The man himself will be playing all the songs that you know and love and introducing you to some new ones along the way.

From Cold Chisel to a stellar solo career Jimmy Barnes has done it all, even being inducted into the ARIA Hall of Fame not once but twice. With live performances spanning over forty years, and two bestselling books under his belt, 'Barnesy' is showing no signs of slowing down... Kim Parnell

### What are some of your memories about life on the road with Iconic band Cold Chisel?

I have great memories of touring with Cold Chisel. The best thing about it wasn't the money or the travel. It was that feeling of us against the world. We were five guys who had only each other and we depended only on each other. Every night we went onto a new stage somewhere in Australia and worked our hardest to make some sort of impression on whoever happened to be there. Most nights in the early days people turned up randomly. They might have had a friend tell them something about us, or just wanted a night out and we were the only option. But whatever the reason they were there. We had a couple of hours to win them over or we might not see them again. We liked the challenge.

### What did the years with Cold Chisel teach you as a musician and as a solo artist?

You have to work hard. Every single night is important. When you hit the stage, you have to put it all out there. There is no next time. Give them everything and leave nothing in the tank. Then, maybe they will come back. If you do this every night you might make a life out of live performance.

## Tell us a little about your new album 'Criminal Record' that is coming out in May – What can we expect?

The album is sort of an extension of what I have learned from writing my two books. Taking those themes and writing about where they have taken me to now. There is definitely a sense of being ready to move on and play rock'n'roll again. But I think that the whole writing process has improved my songwriting a lot. There are songs that I have written with Don Walker that I am very proud of. Don and I have written together for many years, but I think that we found something special this time. A way of really getting things done. The songs are tough, gritty and most importantly, very real. At least to me. And one thing I learned from writing the books is that what affected me is not that different to what affects a lot of listeners out there. We are all trying to get by in life. We all struggle in our own way. And despite all our differences, we all have a lot in common. There are a couple of great songs written by and with Troy Cassar-Daley too. Troy is a great musician and an amazing writer, and I was so happy to get to work with him on this project. He knew what I wanted to say. Chris Cheney wrote a great song for me and I can see him becoming a great person to write with in the future. He is one of my favourite people. A great guitar player, songwriter and a great guy. And I have started writing with my son in law Ben Rodgers. We started writing together for the last Chisel record and we are doing really good things now.







Executive Chef @ Bay Fusion Food Design Shares with us his favourite Recipes.



#### Ingredients - feed 4

#### Chicken

600g Diced chicken thigh 1x small knob Ginger and 30ml light soy sauce 2lt Vegetable oil - small deep fry on around 160-170 degrees 1 cup corn flour 2 tablespoons flour

#### Spice mix

1 tsp five spice 1 tsp castor sugar 1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp garlic powder

#### Asian slaw

1/4 red cabbage 1/4 cabbage 1/4 red onion 1/4 small wombok 1/2 bunch shallots 1/4 bunch celery 1x carrot julienne 1x coriander bunch Black or white sesame seeds

#### **Dressing Nam-Jing**

6 cloves garlic 4 small birds' eye chillies optional for food lovers 1 long red chilli 4 tbsp castor sugar 3 tbsp fish sauce juice of 2 limes tbsp finely coriander stalks and leave

#### Soy wasabi mayo

200ml soy milk 100ml white wine vinegar 1tsp Dijon mustard Roast garlic (if available) 1tube of wasabi 1lt oil vegetable 10g Salt and 5g white pepper

Combine the soy sauce and ginger in a bowl. Add the chicken and toss to coat. Marinate for 1 hour

Drain the chicken from the marinade and pat dry.

Prepare shallow fryer or deep fryer, by adding oil and heating to 170°C over medium-high heat.

Place combined flour on a plate. Add one-third of the chicken and toss to coat. Shake off any excess. Cook, turning halfway through cooking, for 4-5 minutes or until cooked through. Repeat, in 2 more batches reheating the oil between batches. Place finished product onto large plate with paper towel.

Sprinkle five spice mix over warm chicken.

#### Spice mix

Add all ingredients in a bowl and store - depending where you buy your five spice from if it is to strong add more castor sugar, fine salt or even a little

#### Nam-Jing


Place all ingredients in to food processor. If you like it sweeter add sugar, hotter add chilli, saltier add fish sauce or sour add more lime. Only add 1/4 tea spoon at any time as it will throw the recipe out if you play too much.

#### Soy dressing

Add all ingredients except the oil in to food processor, pour oil in and thicken. This recipe is versatile if you don't like wasabi then don't add it.

Shred all ingredients on mandolin or by peeler/grater. This is one of my staple salad bases as I can add and remove ingredients to make slaws and other





### **COFFEE** COLUMN



Domestic espresso machines come through the workshop for repairs all the time. They generally present with the same problems. Now it sounds as if we just want to get out of doing some work (which is completely true). You bought the machine in the first place because you wanted to make coffee at home just as well as they did in the cafe, right? Well, doing everything a good cafe does to make your \$4 takeaway so exceptional is required at home too.

#### Big tip # 1 — Back flushing

If your machine has a three way or solenoid valve (check your manual) then back flush,!!

Most home machines make one or two coffees a day, then sit idle for 24hrs. If you don't back flush it's like eating a bowl of cereal, leaving the bowl on the bench and using it again the next day. Gross — and eventually you're going to run into problems. Read instructions in the manual or look them up on the internet.

Daily: After every coffee making session, you should back flush with water

Weekly: Run the same process, this time with some espresso clean (1/4 tsp) and before taking it out, let it sit for a few minutes.

#### Tip # 2 — 98% of coffee is water

Put good water into your machine. Bottled water. Australia's water supply contains a large amount of ground water and, particularly if you're in The Bay, heed this warning as tap water can be devastating to your machine So if you want longevity from your machine, find the best quality, softest water possible. Good water will also make a dramatic improvement to your coffee quality.

#### Tip # 3 — Clean and open workspace

The cleaner you keep your workspace, the more your machine will love you. Roaches love warm electronic boards, and if they get in there, they can cause havoc. Quite simply, a dirty workspace will attract them, and the warm environment will make them call it home. Keep it all clean.

#### Coffee of the month

Long Black Is the Australian version of the black coffee and is prepared by filling a porcelain cup ¾ full of boiling water and then pouring a double shot 60ml of coffee on top.

# THE PASTAND AS AUGUST THE PICSON TO THE PICSON THE PIC

With Greig Bolderrow

I have walked through the Gallipoli to Armistice memorial in Maryborough on several occasions, but a few weeks ago my experience was a little different as I had my very own Tour Guide, Greig Bolderrow.

He is engaging, warm, funny and very passionate about the memorial and about the Maryborough Walk of Achievers. In fact, Greig gives a lot to our community in many different capacities, which is why he was recently named the 2019 Fraser Coast Citizen of the year. — Kim, Editor

### Tell us a bit about your childhood memories of growing up in Maryborough?

Back then it was all about the outdoors, you rode your bike everywhere. But by the time you got to grade 12 it was kind of uncool to ride a bike, so we would put our ports on the handlebars and walk with our bikes instead.

One of our favourite haunts as kids was Teddington Weir, they had a pool and a diving board, we would dive into Tinana Creek, and sometimes my mates and I would be gone for the whole day.

Sport played a large role in our lives growing up, for me it was Hockey and swimming.

Mum was a florist and had her own business in town, just down the road from Langers Broadway Shoe Store, which is still there today, Dad worked at the newspaper.

I also remember many wonderful holidays in Hervey Bay, it was always a special place as my Grandma and Granddad used to own the Pier Café at the end of the Urangan Pier, prior to the second world war and through to about 1942.

#### Tell us about your years in radio, how has radio changed today?

I joined the radio station 4MB, on the thirtieth of November 1971. I actually went on air as a relief announcer two days after I finished my senior exams. I had been doing work experience just before that, mum knew the boss. Not long after that the person that I was relieving left, and I was offered the job, that was my start in radio.

I started off doing the night time program, this was on air from 6pm and went through till 11pm at night, then the station closed down until 5.30am the next morning. Within twelve months I was doing the breakfast program, I continued to do this for five or six years.

During my time in radio I have interviewed many people including lots of prime ministers and entertainers, everyone from Johnny O Keefe through to Kamal. I would say the most memorable interview was with a gentleman named Warren Mitchell, he played the part of Alf Garnett in a television show on the BBC called Till Death Us Do Part. He was touring Australia with his one man show which was called The Thoughts of Chairman Alf. Everyone knew him as a comedian back then. He was also one of the most talented Shakespearian actors I have ever had the pleasure to watch. Well one day he came in and did the breakfast show with me. I remember he was due in at 7 am, and I was there at 5am getting ready to go on air, when a buzzer sounded and it was Warren saying...Hello, it is Warren Mitchell here, sorry I am a bit early... well suffice to say, he ended up doing the whole of the breakfast show with me, not just his hour, it was a great broadcast! I have spent many years in radio across many stations.

From a listener's point of view radio probably hasn't changed much. But from an inside view there is less advertising per hour now, and everything is almost totally automated. There's no records, no cassettes, and very few live reads on commercials.

#### What is the significance of the Gallipoli to Armistice memorial?

It is a memorial to honour the sacrifice made by so many Maryborough men and women in not only that campaign but the second world war, Korea, Malaysia, Vietnam and now Afghanistan. Yes, it is about the memories of the soldiers from Gallipoli and world war I, but it is a memorial to all soldiers, nurses and personnel that have sacrificed a hell of a lot to give us what we have today.

Incredible, that was a total surprise and an absolute honour. We all got an email saying that we had been nominated for an Australia Day Award, but it wasn't until the presentation that I found out which one.


#### What does the future of the Fraser Coast look like in your eyes?

Rosy – We have had a huge year as far as tourism is concerned. We were very fortunate that Harry and Meagan visited Fraser Island, that was just a huge boost. People can also now dive the Tobruk. We have got such wonderful assets right here, not only have we got Fraser Island and Lady Elliot Island on our doorstep, but we also have beautiful beaches in Hervey Bay, and the incredible whales. Maryborough has the incredible history and magnificent buildings, we also have vast rural surrounds, everything is just ripe for the picking.

We have also seen an economic boost injected into the region, we have Walkers being awarded the contract to repair the new rolling stock. Then there is the munitions factory getting off the ground in Maryborough. In all honesty I see more positivity on the Fraser Coast in the last twelve months, than I have seen in years.

#### Do you have a message to the people of the Fraser Coast?

In my acceptance speech for citizen of the year I talked about great innovative companies that are putting money back into the community, and as a closing statement I said, 'Those of you that know me would know that I worked in radio for a very long time. That may have just sounded like a commercial for the Fraser Coast, and it was, It's a bloody good product. Buy it, love it, be proud of it!

# Breaking Cround

This solo presentation by Chinese Australian artist Pamela See (Xue Mei-Ling) celebrates the 160th year anniversary of Maryborough being declared an immigration port. The title, 'Breaking Ground', references the short-term leasing of allotments to Chinese migrants during the nineteenth century. This arrangement benefited both the 'aliens', who could not purchase property, and the European settlers to whom the land was returned cleared and 'fit for cultivation'. A range of industries that utilised the port have been explored in the artworks. Prior to the gold rush, which commenced with the discovery of gold by James Nash in 1867, timber and wool were amongst the key. The prolific importation of goods by the Chinese community from colonial times has also been illustrated.

See is presently undertaking a PhD at Griffith University. Her research focuses on post-digital applications for papercutting. The perforation of paper to record information dates back to the First Dynasty of Egypt (c.3150 – c.2890 BCE), when incised papyrus parchment provided a mobile alternative to inscribed clay tablets. The invention of modern pulp-strained paper in 105 CE is attributed the Chinese eunuch Cai Lun. The style of papercutting that is broadly recognised as traditional Chinese developed in the agricultural region near the Yangzi River between the fourth and sixth centuries. See's technique bears resemblance to Foshan papercutting, which is endemic to her maternal home province of Fujian. Emerging during the Song Dynasty (960 – 1279 CE) this style is applied to both paper and thin foils of metal.

The artworks in Breaking Ground range in materials from knitted blankets to acrylic sculptures. It also contains papercut portraits of prominent members of the Maryborough Chinese community: George Hing, Sidney Shang and James Chiam.

See was born in Brisbane to first generation Chinese Australians. Since 1997, she has contributed to exhibitions in Australia, China and the United States of America. This includes initiatives at The Qing Tong Museum (China), International Studios and Curatorial Program (New York) and the Queensland Art Gallery. Collections to house See's artwork include the National Gallery of Australia, the Art Gallery of South Australia and Parliament House.

In 2005 she received a General Funding Grant from the Australia China Council, which enabled her to research papercutting in a number of regional centres in China including Shandong Province, Xian Province and Guangdong Province. In 2006 she undertook a residency in the Beijing-based foundry the Pickled Art Center, with the support of a Brisbane City Council Creative Sparks Grant. In 2009 she received a Professional Development Grant from the Australia Council for the Arts. This enabled her to undertake a residency at the University of Massachusetts and contribute to the Conflux Festival in New York City and The Fingers Lake Environmental Film Festival in Ithaca NY.

The four-wheel driving tracks can be challenging, but make some of the more interesting places accessible that are off the beaten track. Sometimes you can walk or drive on the inland tracks without seeing another soul for hours.

Going to Fraser Island is always a photographic event as there is so much to see, from wildlife to the gorgeous sandy beaches the deep forest, and the many natural lakes, You can't help but snap away!

We do lots of exploring, and never go hungry. With many challenges to face along the way, this is the time for some of us to push past inhibitions and to face fears.

No trip is complete without lunch and a refreshing liquid beverage at Kingfisher Bay Resort before heading home on the barge!

To us, it doesn't really matter what the weather does as we always make the most of every trip, there is always something new that happens, or a new experience to be had. 


The 2019 calendar (still available for sale) launched on the 14th of September in Melbourne. All of the models gathered to see their artwork featured in the calendar.
