



5 COMING TO MARYBOROUGH

I have to admit that I didn't know very much about 'Steampunk' at all. It was somewhere at the edge of my consciousness. But delving deeper over the last few days, it didn't take me long to discover that there is an enchanting, enticing world out there that I had only ever danced on the very edge of.

Steampunk is all about combining the 19th century with today's world. Think back to a time when steam power was all there was, imagine if you woke up tomorrow and found that you had to use steam power to operate the vast amount of modern technology that we use today.

Having a passion for promoting the region and sharing all that Maryborough has to offer; organisers Jenny Elliott and Maggie John from Timeless Mary have been working on bringing the Steampunk phenomena to the city for over three years. Kim Parnell – Editor

Well known for its historic facades and links to steam engines, Maryborough is now being discovered by enthusiasts of the underground pop culture known as Steampunk.

Hidden in plain sight, Steampunk style pours from Maryborough's heritage centre at every turn. Attractions like the Mary Ann steam train, Bond Store, Portside precinct and CBD make a perfect visual backdrop for a style that never grows old.

STEAMPUNK IS A MODERN TITLE GIVEN TO WHAT PEOPLE FROM THE VICTORIAN/EDWARDIAN ERA MIGHT HAVE IMAGINED THE FUTURE TO LOOK LIKE. HOLLYWOOD HAS CERTAINLY EMBRACED THE THEME WHICH IS REMARKABLY COMMON TO RESIDENTS OF MARYBOROUGH.

The backdrop for Steampunk already exists with the Mary Ann, the MELSA trains, the flywheel sculpture (Ellena Street), the time machine at the Bond Store, the electrical box robots in the CBD, the Rotunda in Queens Park, Wharf Street and all of the heritage buildings.

Parents of school aged children might recognise the S.T.E.A.M. acronym as part of the educational curriculum Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics, it's also been the catchcry in developing this event which brings Art and Technology together in a new and interesting way. There will be a story line from the vintage engines through to the first 3D scanner of its type in Queensland, including a makerspace stall and electronics workshops.

2019 will also see the STEM based Fraser Coast Technology Challenge add the 'A' for Arts into the program to become STEAM.

We would like to attempt a World Record for a gathering of Steampunk enthusiasts and know that Maryborough people love an excuse to dress-up, so we are offering a Steampunk event in the form of the Tiffin Tea Party, when three or more Steampunk gather for tea. Coincidentally the architect who designed the Bond Store was Charles Tiffin.


We invite you, both young and old, to put together your best Steampunk costume and come along and join in the fun on Saturday 29 June in Queens Park from 1pm to 4pm. Afternoon tea will be available to purchase or bring your own picnic.

The Steampunk festivities will include the firing of the Time Cannon, historic engine display, tea duelling, Steampunk merchandise, costume competition, bag pipes and other entertainment. The Mary Ann and MELSA Trains will be operating and the Museums in Wharf Street will remain open for the afternoon.

In the form of Timeless Mary, STEAMFESTA, the Tiffin Tea Party has been recently added to this year's Mary Poppins Festival program.

I last spoke to you roughly about a year ago. How has life changed for you since then?

Actually, things have been uncharacteristically steady. Since re-uniting with my childhood sweetheart in March 2018, my personal life stopped being chaotic, and everything else seemed to follow suit... a fair bit of touring across the year, another stint on Cruisin' Country, and the rest of it was finishing material for a new album that as always seems to have the gestation period of an elephant.

Tell us a little about your new album '30 Years of Pride'- A tribute to James Blundell?

It was a surprise initially, and then a delight to see what contemporary artists did with tracks that are now nearing 30 years of age. One of the pleasures was knowing a lot of the acts from their start in the industry, so there was definitely a paternal element to the experience, and I feel that a lot of the reworks were better than the originals. It was also gratifying to see that the ideas behind the songs still held up this far down the track.

Your career has spanned thirty years, what were some of the highs and lows during that period?

There have been innumerable highlights and not too many lows thankfully. Touring with Kris Kristofferson, one of my absolute idols, was a huge privilege, meeting Joni Mitchell in a Japanese restaurant on Santa Monica Boulevard another, Getting to know Slim Dusty over years of shared performances, watching Keith Urban's career hit the

stratosphere, working and writing with Lee Kernaghan over 20 some odd years, playing with some of the best musicians Australia has ever seen, and recently touring with my oldest son Briar... all of these build a lifetime of memories that make the miles worth it.

Lows were the impact months away from home has had on marriages, experiencing big album sales and absolute stiffs took some acclimatising to, but in the end, I've been blessed beyond words to do what I love for the last 30 years, sometimes paid a King's ransom, and at others looking at a dozen people in the audience. When I work with young artists, they inevitably ask for the secrets to success' and the answer is always be yourself, and when you stop enjoying it, stop doing it'

This year you were inducted into the Australasian Country Music Roll of Renown, and join a very impressive list of Country Music legends - what did this feel like?

I remember sitting through my first two or three Tamworth Awards ceremonies thinking 'What have these people done to be acknowledged in this way?'. The night I was inducted, I looked down to the front row, and saw a lot of extremely talented young artists who were probably thinking exactly the same thing. Personally, it was a moment of looking at all the miles, years, and experiences that had bought the induction, and realising that there was never any thought of what would happen 'down the track' when I started. I think it's the only way you can really cope with a long career, take each day as it comes, and always put the music first... at least that way they won't be playing a song at your funeral that makes you wish you'd never written it.

Who were your musical influences growing up?

The Seekers Joni Mitchell Slim Dusty James Taylor The Angels Bob Dylan The Eagles Bruce Springsteen The Rolling Stones John Mellencamp The Beatles


You get the idea... very diverse, and that's only todays list, it'd be different again tomorrow.

Chicken Pesto Sausage Rolls

(makes approx. 24 minis)

INGREDIENTS:

1x brown onion
1x broccoli head
250 g of mushrooms
500 g of chicken (minced or
finely chopped)
3-4 tablespoons of Pesto

Method

Let cool. Preheat oven at 180 degrees. Put mixture in puff pastry & roll. Lather roll with coconut oil or butter to seal.

Cook for 15 mins or until golden brown. Serve and enjoy!

For the past 3 years, the Hervey Bay PCYC boxing academy has showcased the talent of local, state and interstate boxers by way of a Fight Night, and 2019 will be continuing to do so. Executive Chef @ Bay Fusion Food Design Shares with us his favourite Recipes.



I'm very excited about the launch of our new Arkarra LOW+SLOW catering division, and one of the cuts I absolutely love to barbecue in our smoker pits is Beef Short Ribs. These are usually available from your butcher in 3 or 5 bone racks or sometimes trimmed individually. Because the meat on the ribs is the muscle that keeps the animals breathing, it works very hard and is tough to chew unless it is cooked correctly. Low and slow barbecuing or braising in your oven if you don't have a smoker can create the perfect winter warmer comfort dish by following these few simple steps:

- 1. Trim the excess fat off the top of the ribs, and peel off the silver skin membrane from underneath.
- 2. Season generously all over with a "rub" made from salt, pepper, garlic powder, onion powder and paprika, or use your favourite BBQ
- 3. If you are barbecuing low and slow, preheat your BBQ pit to around 135C, add a couple of wood chunks and place the ribs bone side down on the grill using an indirect heat method. I like to use Cherry or Plum wood for beef short ribs, but banksia cones gathered from our nearby beaches work amazingly well also, producing a mild native bush smoke flavour. You will need to monitor internal temperatures of the meat using a probe and be prepared for a long low and slow cook to achieve perfect tenderness. This process may take up to 10 hours, so an early start is recommended.
- 4. Spritz every hour with a spray of 50% apple juice and 50% apple cider vinegar.
- 5. When the internal temperature of the meat reaches approx 80C and you are happy with the "bark" crust formed on the ribs, wrap them tightly in heavy duty alfoil with a few pats of butter and a splash of beef stock. Put the foil parcels back into the smoker until the internal temp of the meat reaches approximately 100C and the ribs are "squishy" to touch and the bones can be pulled out without resistance. Loosen the foil wrapping and leave to rest in a warm place for a while before plating up.
- 6. Serve with buttery mashed potatoes, corn on the cob, a crunchy slaw and a tangy BBQ sauce for a taste sensation to wow your guests.



COFFEE COLUMN





Why Do Coffee Roasters Favour Blends?
Why is it that it is rare to walk into a café and get your coffee made from just Ethiopian coffee beans, or just Costa Rican coffee beans?

Simply put, roasters try to give their consumers the best of a few different beans to make the coffee as complex as possible. A coffee with good mouthfeel (Brazil) is no good without aroma (Papuan New Guinea) or aftertaste (Mexican Altura). Coffee enthusiasts love tasting single origin coffees to taste the distinctions in those coffees, but if you are a café trying to maximize your revenue by satisfying as many people as possible, you will want to give them espresso with mouthfeel, aroma, aftertaste, good crema, acidity and smoothness but not bitterness (the end product being much better than the sum of its individual parts), so too does a coffee roaster. Roasters can create blends for complementarity sometimes and at other times to create contrasts – depending of course on what their wholesale customer may think their consumers would be interested in drinking. They may find a couple of beans that go really nicely together, such as Ethiopian and Brazilian and another couple that stand in stark contrast with each other such as Sumatran and Kenyan and tailor blends based on those similarities and differences.

The golden rule for roasters is to create a flavour profile and be consistent with it.

Single Origins v Blends - Which type of coffee is better?

Most coffee companies in Australia sell blends therefore arguably blends must be better. These companies probably want to offer their wholesale cafe customers and in turn their consumers a complex tasting coffee, giving them more than just one attribute that a single origin may be able to offer them.

At the end of the day though, nobody can say that one particular coffee is better than another or one blend any better than another. All we know is that if you have a half-decent machine even at home, buying single origins after drinking blends all your life can be a refreshing experience and a thoroughly enriching one.

Maryborough Players Turns 70





The Maryborough Players Inc turns 70 on June 7 in what will be a mammoth achievement. The celebrations will be held on June 8 in what looks like a great event.

The current committee made up of President, Gail Endres, Vice-President, John Lawrence and Secretary and Treasurer, Loretta Lawrence all have one thing in common, all have been involved in Maryborough Players since the seventies and would have many stories to tell.

The Maryborough Players Inc came into being on June 7 in 1949 when the first meeting was held.

JC Comans was elected President with a committee comprising of Messrs J Pizzey, H Cooper, N Neilsen, I Davies, R Murphy and L Dierig. Miss Doreen Wilson was the first Secretary. Members elected to the production committee were, Dorothy Dempster, Wilf Robertson and Jack Gardiner.

During the first decade the Maryborough Players produced and performed thirty-three act plays. But it wasn't until 1957 when they performed musical 'Toad of Toad Hall' that the 'love affair' was born between the players and musical productions.

In the 60's and 70's many musicals followed Carousel, The King and I, South Pacific, Guys and Dolls, Brigadoon and Annie Get Your Gun, other musicals performed and enjoyed by many were Chicago, The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas, Grease, Charlie Girl, The Wizard of Oz, Oliver, Little Shop of Horrors, Pirates of Penzance and Wind in the Willows. There have been so many more, far too many to mention here.

In 1971 the Maryborough Players bought a building in Aubinville. It became well known as the Aubinville Playhouse. The Junior Theatre was also held in the Playhouse and played a key role in developing and nurturing a love of theatre and acting to the next generation.


After many successful productions the Playhouse was sold in 1999. The Maryborough Players had also purchased the Maryborough Little Theatre in 1997. This building was then sold in the year 2000.

Vice-President John Lawrence said, "I've been in shows with a cast of thousands and shows with only six or eight members, one thing that I can say is that I have never regretted a moment.

Every part is important, whether you have one line or a thousand. Or if you help backstage or front of house.

"The last few years have been difficult as we have not had a home, but we've faced problems like this before, we will survive".



It had been over seven years since artist Nicole Duyst picked up a paint brush and thought about creating her latest exhibition 'Zest'. As the curator for the Hervey Bay Regional Gallery for many years, Nicole focused on supporting and promoting other artists.

'Life had gotten very busy and as a curator I spent so much time promoting and working with artists, my own practice took a back seat for many years. It wasn't until I stepped out of full-time work that I had time to think about creating again", said Ms Duyst.

After many years away from the studio it wasn't as easy as just picking up a brush and starting again. "Artists put so much of themselves into their work and as they change so does their creative practice. I honestly felt that even though I had exhibited in the past, I was really starting from scratch. I wasn't the person I was seven years ago and my art wasn't the same either."

"I think in my twenties creating art was very much a release for me. After leaving a very controlling religious cult that I was raised in, art was definitely a huge part of my recovery. Art allowed me to release feelings that I didn't know existed until I started painting. I think painting really played a large part in learning to live a full and content life. Fast forward 20 years and I amhappy! Without big emotional issues to work through my whole reason for creating had changed. I literally threw away all my dark colours and bought an entirely new palette of bright colours. I stood at my easel with no idea what to paint and no idea why I needed to'.

Nicole persisted through months of mistakes and discarded paintings until finally something just clicked. On a walk to her local beach at Point Vernon she picked a bunch of native gum blossoms, came home and started painting them. "It was like the creative flood gates just opened and suddenly colour, texture and energy just flowed so easily. Like I didn't even have to try. It was so exciting to find a way to create that came from a space of happiness and zest for life'.

Nicole's new works feature native flowers, animals, food and textures in a loose abstract style. She describes them as 'proudly low brow'. 'I've done serious art for so long. I just want people to smile and enjoy these works. They are bright, fun and are sometimes ridiculous. A bit like me really!"

After creating a series of paintings Nicole discovered her designs worked well as fabrics and homewares. "I am really at the start of figuring out what I can make with my designs. So far,I have made cushions, bags, scarfs and even a 1950s circle skirt. It's really exciting to see people walking around with a bag I have designed or one of my cushions on their lounge. I have lots of ideas for other pieces to create and I am really just enjoying the process at the moment'.

Nicole's exhibition Zest featuring a range of art, prints, cushions and fabrics will be on display from 31 May at Gatakers Artspace. "It seemed like a good time to exhibit during the Relish Food Festival. It's a great opportunity to celebrate the simple and good things in life; food, wine, art and lovely friends. I hope people who visit my exhibition leave feeling happy and energised with a bit of zest in their day."

Zest is on display from 31 May to 30 June. Opening night is at 6pm - Friday 31 May and everyone is welcome to attend.





A little bit of History

The Rotary Living Expo began as the Garden Expo in 1998. The first event was a joint venture between the Rotary club of Hervey Bay and Fraser Coast Anglican College held in the college grounds. The following year Rotary ran the event held at Seafront oval. Profits from this and the following years went toward construction of Hospital House, a home style share kitchen accommodation to be constructed within the grounds of the Hervey Bay hospital to provide accommodation for families of patients from remote areas. In 2006 the Rotary clubs of Hervey Bay City and Hervey Bay Sunrise joined together to run the Expo. The proceeds from that year were allocated to the final funds needed to build Hospital House. In the following years the clubs took rotation to nominate a project of choice. The three Hervey Bay Rotary clubs combined their efforts for this event, and money raised went towards projects like Hospital House, furnishings for the new Community Centre, Rural Fire Brigade, Care flight, Wig library, Books for Babies program, The All-abilities swing park, Homelessness, Literacy, Miriam's Cottage, Emergency **Evacuation Kits for Disaster Evacuation Centres Burrum Heads and** Howard and many others.

The name was changed from the Rotary Garden Expo to the Rotary Living Expo to provide a wider appeal and attract a wider range of exhibitors.

The Rotary Living Expo has raised about \$350,000 for Hervey Bay Rotary projects over the past ten years.

The Living Expo attracts around 5000 visitors each year and features over 100 stalls and displays. Also, some amazing food from around the world and professional musicians and entertainers all weekend. We have plenty for the Children to enjoy and Raffles and prizes available to visitors, great travel deals, caravan and boat displays and much more.

Rotary is made up of people from all walks of life, who voluntarily give their time and skills to improve the lives of both the locals in their own towns and cities and beyond. It's the largest service organisation in the world and is the only one to have a seat on the UN. Rotary's largest international project is its 40-year vaccination program to eradicate the debilitating disease Polio from the world, and we expect to achieve this sometime in the next two years. From over 500,000 cases around the globe in 1970 to just a handful of cases in 2017, and the efforts continue with matching donations from Dick Smith contributing hugely. We have vaccinated over 2.5 billion children against this crippling disease. There hasn't been a case of polio in Australia since 1972.

Some of the money raised from this year's event will be directed to local needs and to purchase defibrillators for various local groups.


