PAYS TRIBUTE TO BILLY JOEL

How long have you been a performer, tell us a little about your history?

I have been in the game for over 25 years, I was in a cover band before, mainly in South Australia but also travelling nationally. It was during this time that people would point out that I looked like Billy Joel, it just so happened that I was a big fan of the man himself so it had been on my mind for a fair while to put together a tribute to Billy but time and other logistics always got in the way. The show actually started here in Adelaide in some local theatres, and quickly grew into a bigger performance we then took it national.

What is your favourite Billy Joel song?

It is very hard to nail down just one song but probably 'Scene From An Italian Restaurant'. to me it encapsulates everything about Billy Joel in the one song. From a ballad to Rock n Roll, it covers every style that he has ever done over the years. It also tells a great story.

Tell us a little about your battle with Multiple Sclerosis, how does it affect day to day life and performing?

I was diagnosed in 2016, It was around the time I was getting the Billy Joel tribute concert together. I did not know much about Multiple Sclerosis at the time, I had heard of it but didn't know what it was. It threw me into a bit of a spin, I wasn't sure if I should pursue the Billy thing. But after being diagnosed and the initial shock wore off, it was something that I had to learn to deal with and manage. I decided to take a positive outlook on it. I have changed my diet and changed my preparation for shows, so far so good.

Everyone's symptoms are different, for me, it is energy levels. I get very lethargic which is why in the lead up to a performance I have to really manage my routine - what I eat and when I eat, also hydration levels.

Multiple Sclerosis affects your nerves so when you get naturally anxious before a show, my body feels a lot different than it would of 10 years ago. I have to really control that and literally talk to myself to calm myself down. But once I get into the show and am 2 or 3 songs in, I am good.

It is one of those silent diseases, a lot of people don't see the physical symptoms and also a lot of people don't talk about it, we can all help by talking about it. Getting support is very important.

Have you performed on the Fraser Coast before?

No never, we are excited to be coming to your region. To date the only place, we have played in Queensland is the Gold Coast. We are extensively doing this show from Cairns all the way to Sydney, we have about 31 shows lined up this year. And about 15 of them are down the east coast. We are really looking forward to it.

Do you have a special message for the people of the Fraser Coast about your upcoming show?

We want everyone to keep supporting live music, in this world of technology we don't want live music to die out. We are paying tribute to his music, I don't impersonate Billy, we are always respectful to Billy and his music.

The show has a lot of energy and is good fun. People can't help but to get up and dance. Even if they walk in half-hearted, they walk away massive Billy Joel fans which is why we do it.

Every Mother's Day, individuals, couples, families and groups don pink and do their bit for an important cause.

You can either walk, run or volunteer for the day. It is all about getting together and showing support.

Event Organiser, Eliza Carige said, "We are introducing a brand-new event this year as part of the Mother's Day Classic, with the inclusion of a one kilometre 'All Abilities Race', as well as our usual 100m Kids Dash, our 1, 2 and 5km walk and our 5km run".

Event volunteer Martina Hallan lost her Nan to Breast Cancer while living in her hometown of Wales in England, and since relocating to Hervey Bay has volunteered for the Hervey Bay Mother's Day Classic for the past three years in honour of her Nan. "Nowadays the prognosis is a lot better than it was then. The surgery is different, the medication is different, there is a lot more positive help out there", said Martina.

"A cure would be great to see, but I think it is the continuation of the development of medicine and supporting the people and the families that are involved", Martina added.

The event will be held at the newly revamped Seafront Oval, amidst a sea of pink. In previous years there has been everything from pink tutus, grown men in pink wigs, dogs in tutus, and families in capes. Some people go to a lot of trouble planning their costumes, with some organising costumes well in advance.

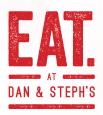

It's April and Easter is upon us. As usual Arkarra Gardens will be closed for the public holidays, but we will be open for a special Easter Sunday breakfast session featuring two Easter Egg Hunts with the Easter Bunny leading the kids around the gardens. And of course, Arkarra is otherwise open seven days a week for delicious breakfasts, brunches, lunches and hot and cold refreshments and treats.

The Easter long weekend is traditionally a time to relax and spend quality time with family and friends. Many of you will have guests visiting and will be organising catch ups and gatherings. Our Bali Huts at Arkarra are great intimate venues to host special get-togethers.

I always feel that delicious dishes are central to special moments, and that days off are especially perfect to treat yourself to something special like a slightly more substantial breakfast dish from our all-day dining board.

So for those so inclined, I would recommend trying our Arkarra Breakie Steak served with our house-made bacon jam, mushrooms, hash browns, tomatoes and fried eggs. There is nothing terribly complex about making this dish so I won't go into recipe details, other than to say that using quality ingredients when preparing is the key, and that quickly searing a thin cut rib fillet steak on a smoking hotplate then letting it rest before plating are the secrets to a flavoursome, tender delight.

Another popular substantial breakfast treat at Arkarra would be our hot-smoked Huon salmon benny. Again, using quality ingredients is the key to this dish, with fresh Turkish bread toasted quickly cut-side down on the hotplate providing the perfect base and the extra crunch.

I hope you all enjoy this special time of the year.

TERRA TRIBE FARM

Terra Tribe Farm is the dream that our family has had for many years, to live sustainably off-grid, growing our own food using permaculture methods. Our family of 7 live on 12.5 acres in Howard, which we are transforming from bare cow paddocks to a flourishing hive of insect and plant activity and a food hub that will feed our family and community.

The forest school idea is to bring children into nature. As adults, most of us remember our childhood of endless time outside in the bush or riding our bikes. My fondest childhood memories are the times I spent in a local creek where I built, explored and climbed trees. Nowadays these spaces are rare to find or unsafe. Terra Tribe Farm has created a safe environment for families and children to come and explore, climb as high as they want, to capture tadpoles and have fun outdoors in nature. Along with exploring and taking risks in a safe environment, part of our program is to teach skills that have almost been lost in one generation. Children as young as 2 are using whittling peelers to debark wood, moving onto knives as their skill increases and learning to shape wood with their hands. It's hard work but the sense of accomplishment is huge.

As we move into winter, fire will become a focus, teaching children, even young children, about fire. They learn the risks, impacts and also the benefits. Surprisingly, since the forest school has opened, I have seen how children are capable to create play and extend their natural instincts for learning. Relationships are formed between children who don't know each other beforehand. Almost immediately they dive into play with one another, regardless of age, play being the biggest contributor.

Terra Tribe Farm holds regular programs during school terms. A weekly Forest Kindy for 2-6-year old's and a fortnightly home-school session for school-age children. We also run a school holiday program for school-aged children. Upcoming Easter Holiday sessions are on our Facebook page and website. Looking forward to seeing you out on the farm.

With just five months under their buckles, the newly formed Southern Cross Xtreme Cowboy Racing Club is going from strength to strength. 2020 has been a gallop from the start and things are paying off for the hard-working and passionate members of Southern Cross Xtreme Cowboy Racing!

January saw an influx of 50 plus members and interest from as far south as Caboolture, up to Bundaberg, Agnes Waters, Mackay and out to Gayndah. February saw the club travel down to Caboolture for the QSEC Horse and Home Show, holding a stall for the day and running the lunch-time entertainment and demonstration of Xtreme Cowboy Racing. We were fortunate to have some amazing Australian horsemen and women showcase the challenge for us such as Dan James (Double Dan Horsemanship), Dave Manchon (Rooftop Express Show), Naomi Lee (Shining S Horsemanship), Hollie Shiels (HLS Trick Riding) and Jess Wyse.

March just kept ramping up with members being able to have lessons with world-renowned horseman, Guy McClean. This generous gentleman hosted a mini show at the Hervey Bay Equestrian Centre raising much needed funds for the Burrumbuttocks Hay Runners.

Not slowing down the club then secured International Clinician Magen Warlick for a booked out two-day clinic on the 20th and 21st of March with the State Championships following on, on the Sunday. Magen was also our official judge for this competition. The day incorporated an open morning competition and the afternoon was the official EXCA competition. The official segment of the competition allows members who are EXCA members, the opportunity to compete and earn points which can qualify them to ride at Nationals. The Extreme Cowboy Racing National Championships are held in Victoria each year in Ballarat and are hosted by Downunder Extreme Cowboys. In tallying the total points for the year each of the EXCA members can then potentially qualify for worlds in Texas, USA.

This year Southern Cross Xtreme Cowboy Racing are sending four riders down to compete and represent not only our club but Queensland, as Southern Cross Xtreme Cowboy Racing are the only affiliated club in the state. Natasha Webber, Bianca Hampson, Tammy Scott and James Scott, EXCA members usually compete in two EXCA sanctioned events from mid-November to mid-March to qualify to compete at Nationals. In our case, we are the only EXCA affiliated club in Queensland, so as long as our riders have competed in one sanctioned competition they qualify to enter as "Wildcards". Our riders will compete over two days riding horses supplied by another Victorian Club, High Country Extreme.

It is plain to see that this amazing club is very focused on growing the sport of Extreme Cowboy Racing locally, state and nationally. If you have any questions, we'd love to hear from you!

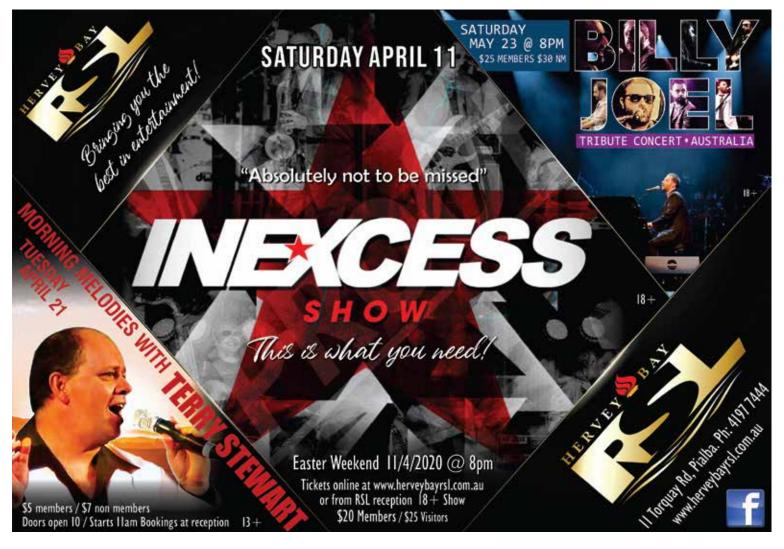

THE TOP 10 THINGS EVERY FISHERMAN TO FRASER NEEDS TO KNOW!!

- Fraser Island has some of the best tailor fishing in Australia particularly from July through to October. Some schools start appearing in May/ June on the southern end of the beach and make their way north as the season progresses. Bigger fish arrive late September and October.
- No matter what the wind direction, you can find protection and fish somewhere on the island. During strong south-easterlies, the northern side of Indian Head or Waddy Point, or the western side of the island, offers protection. Westerly winds are in your face on the western side but are ideal to bring bait in close to shore on the beach side and the Tailor follow.
- 3. The western or calm side of Fraser Island has some fantastic flats fishing using soft plastics or bait. This includes flathead, whiting, bream, grunter and trevally species. The best time of year varies by species, but winter and spring can be awesome.
- 4. Fraser has some of the longest beach worms from any beach in Australia. Six-foot worms are not unheard of! These are the no 1 best bait for whiting and great in bunches for mulloway.
- 5. No matter what time of day or night, there are fish to be caught at Fraser! Tailor are dawn and dusk feeders and mulloway are a better night time proposition. But fish like whiting, flathead, dart, bream and tarwhine are best targeted around the tides. Whiting are great in low tide gutters and flathead best targeted on the falling tide on the western side of the island. Bream, tarwhine and dart are best targeted on the rising tide in holes and around coffee rock.
- 6. The Kingfisher jetty is another great place to target around a change of tide or dawn or dusk. The variety off this jetty has to be seen to be believed and best of all there are great facilities nearby at the Sunset Bar or Sand Bar Bistro for a coffee, beer or lunch/dinner after your session.
- 7. Be aware that from noon 1 August to noon September 30 each year, fishing (other than the collection of worms and pipis by hand) is prohibited on the Fraser Island foreshore within an area from a point 400 m north of Waddy Point to a point 400 m south of Indian Head and 400 m out to sea from low water.
- 8. Let your 4WD tyres down before you hit the beach to the pressure recommended by your vehicle manufacturer. 18 psi is a good general rule with the very thick sand of Ngkala rocks requiring a lower pressure such as 14psi.
- 9. When you stop on the beach, QLD National Park guidelines are that you should park near the top of the beach away from moving traffic. You should also park on an angle so that traffic can see you have stopped. Another word of warning, particularly for newcomers is be very careful "crossing the road" if heading down to the water or back up to the car.
- 10. Be aware of dingos when you are fishing. Keep your bait in buckets with secure lids and fish in closed eskies. Never feed the Dingos with fish or bait scraps. It is not good for their natural hunting instincts and you risk a very big fine.

This gave me a bit of courage to get up and learn some things.... apart from the dancing I learned that I liked it, it was fun, I was pretty good at it, and I got a lot of attention from the ladies watching. which was everything a 15-year-old boy wants!

Out of all the genres to choose from, why Rock & Roll?

reasons:

- 1. It's easy. There are certainly some very complicated moves you can learn, but in our style of rock and roll, if you can walk you can dance.
- 2. It's a great way to have fun and add some romance to your relationship. Dancing with your partner is a guaranteed way to strengthen and deepen your connection.
- 3. The music. Who can deny that rock and roll will never die? It has been around for decades and still gets people's feet tapping.

Tell us about Fonzies Fraser Coast, what is your objective – how long has it been running?

We've been going for just under 12 months now. Our objective is to help people, both those who have learned before and those who have never danced at all, how to dance, have fun and build some great friendships. For us, it is all about the people we get to meet and seeing the smiles on their faces as they take to the dance floor and enjoy their favourite song in a way they never have before. We are all about the fun, not the scorecards

What will people learn in a four-week course?

They will learn our basic rock and roll routine. This is an easy, low impact routine that deals with movements around the basic 4 steps. This is a rolling course and beginners are welcome to join in week one or two, and most people will complete it 2-3 times to have it mastered. Where do you meet and when?

Classes are on every Monday night from 7pm at the Urangan Bowls club

Tell us a little about the costumes from the Rock N Roll era?

All the 50's style outfits you see have become so incredibly easy to get now. There are some great suppliers locally and online. For the gents it can be as simple as some blue jeans, with a shirt and suspenders to finish it off, maybe add a leather jacket for a bit of extra polish. There are some fabulous dresses and skirts available for the ladies. For Natalie and I, a great rock and roll skirt has to have an incredible 'twirl' factor!! That's about the depth of my knowledge on fashion, so I think I'll stick to the dancing!

What other information would you like people to know?

We hold classes for beginners and intermediate dancers, we teach the occasional partner dance also. The bar is open at the club so it's a great night out to learn and have a great time meeting people. You don't need to have a partner, just as long as you're comfortable dancing with someone else who hasn't got one. Classes are \$10 per person for the whole night, and we also hold our own rock and roll social nights too.

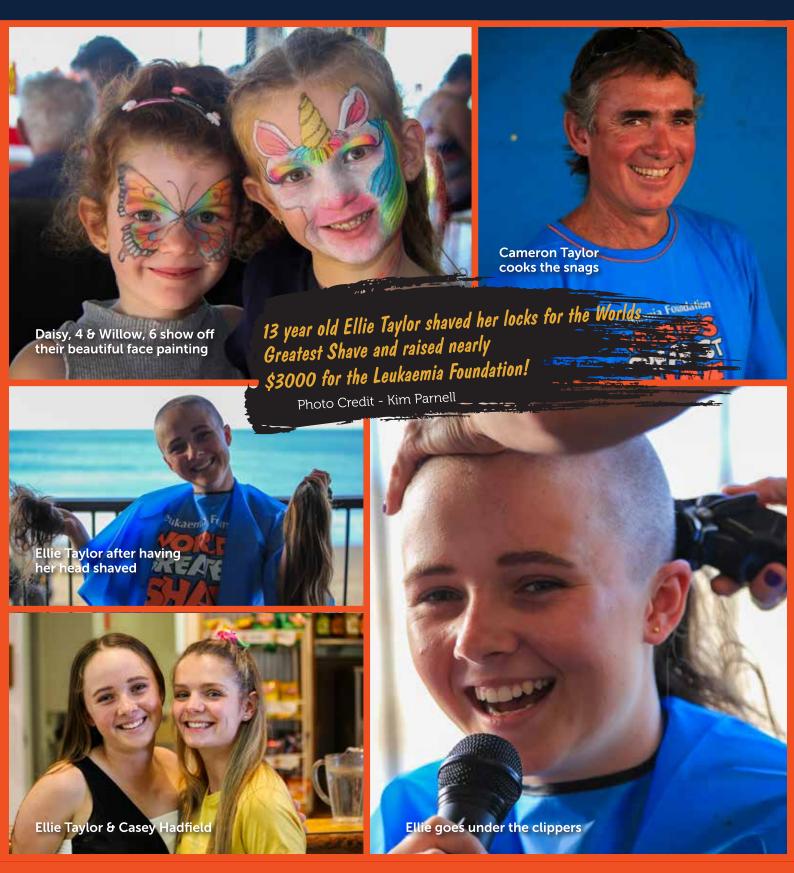

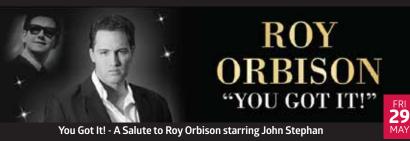
