This month I went on a really scenic 6km walk near Kingfisher Bay Resort on K'Gari Fraser Island, which takes in some unique historic places.

A pleasant walk south along the lovely beach leads to the historic McKenzie's Jetty. This picturesque timber structure was once connected by tramway to the island's only sawmill.

Whilst very peaceful now, this area was once a hive of activity. Just behind the jetty, within the

forest, a community of loggers and their families lived here between 1919 and 1925. Known as North White Cliff, this was a busy timber community, with around 30 cottages, a school, a village store, and of course the mill.

The jetty was connected to the mill by tramline which also extended eastward into the heart of the island to take in the highly productive timber country and a camp.

It's hard to reconcile the busy industry that briefly took place here with the peaceful tranquillity that has returned to the site. To the careful observer, evidence of the community remains in the landscape. The home sites were cut into the hill and the simple two-roomed timber dwellings were built in rows, all on stumps with corrugated iron roofs. The houses have been dismantled but the stumps and bench cuts can

McKenzie's mill was closed in 1925, but the Queensland Forest Service purchased the tramway and jetty, which continued to be used until the mid-1930s

Nearby a very large rusting boiler and a tractor substantially submerged into the sand give further insight into the industry that once made its presence so firmly felt here.

After exploring the old village and timber mill site, the circuit walk returns to Kingfisher Bay Resort along the top of the high cliffs overlooking the beautiful bay.

Here on the clifftops is a very significant historical site that was once top secret: the Z Special Unit commando school. Between 1943 and the end of World War II in 1945 the facility provided intensive training for 909 elite forces to prepare them for special operations behind Japanese lines

This location was chosen because the island's features offered ideal jungle and amphibious training conditions whilst isolation facilitated the necessary secrecy. There was also a fear that Japanese forces may try to land here and so maintaining a base of sorts would provide some protection against that threat.

In addition to tents, the commando school had many permanent

structures including a cinema, lecture huts, 10 bed hospital, weapons and powder magazine, kitchens, workshops, library, post office, boat shed, and a gymnasium. These features can still be interpreted and understood through building foundations, concrete slabs, timber posts and artefact scatters. Amongst the traces and remnants of this once substantial establishment, perhaps the most interesting and unique feature is the large concrete relief map, which was used for training purposes

The training course was intense; designed to push the physical and psychological limits of the trainees. Here, on this site, the trainees were instructed in explosives, unarmed combat, weaponry, physical fitness, navigation, jungle survival, aircraft identification, communication, enemy intelligence and languages such as Malay. The training involved considerable realism and danger.

Returning back to the resort, the path continues to provide spectacular views out over the water from the high cliffs whilst walking through the pristine environment.

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Tell us a little about your background?

I joined the Navy in 1977, at 15 year of age. I was looking for adventure. A visit to the aircraft carrier HMAS Melbourne in Fremantle inspired me to pursue a career as an aviator. I started my military flying training in 1985, a dream come true. After five years flying the Sea King helicopter in the anti-submarine role I ended up flying Army Aviation. During those years I spent time in Timor and the Solomon Islands. The Black Hawk was a fantastic helicopter to fly in the service of our country. I finally resigned from the ADF after 31 years of service.

I now call Bundaberg home and specifically moved there for this job. On my next birthday, I will turn 60. I can't believe it. I am still looking for adventure and loving life!

Why did you become a LifeFlight pilot?

It was a natural progression, I guess for someone who was in the military for so long I just liked that kind of role. As a citizen of this country, military life was perfect for me with the adventure and the unknown, but I couldn't stay in the ADF forever.

The closest thing to the ADF in the civilian world, in my profession as an aviator, is police or rescue work. I enjoy the dynamic of the unknown; that's my character, my style, and this is the type of role where I can continue

Tell us a little about LifeFlight?

LifeFlight is an organisation that started as a surf rescue and search-and-rescue service. The organisation has expanded in size and capability over its 40 year history. We provide rapid response airlifts to injured or ill patients and transport them to hospital.

LifeFlight is also a charity that relies on help from the community to fund our service. This means that we can stay in the air and continue to assist those in need.

What are some of the characteristics of the helicopter and what type of equipment does it carry?

The Bundaberg-based helicopter carries rescue and advanced medical equipment and can get to nearly any place where medical assistance or a rescue is required. It is so versatile and can be taken straight to the scene. The police, ambulance and firefighters are usually the first responders; we are called in if a higher level of clinical care is needed. We can bring in the Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) Critical Care Paramedic

and any emergency staff that are required. Time is paramount to get the patient to hospital for further treatment. As a pilot, part of my role is to ensure that the helicopter is ready to be launched at any time and that I bring the crew and anyone that flies with us safely home again.

Have you done any rescues on the Fraser Coast?

We get call outs to Fraser Island quite a lot, especially in the holiday season. We often get tasked for marine stings; Irukandji, and box jellyfish stings can cause people a lot of grief.

Fraser Island is fairly remote, so when people go there, they need to plan for any eventuality and know what the next step is if they get into a spot of trouble. We are often tasked to respond when people crash their cars, which is often because of poor driving techniques or foolish behaviours on sand and not understanding the

Then there are general illnesses. Some people go to Fraser with preconditions, and are a long way from help if something goes wrong.

Tell us a little about the integral part the medical staff play as part of LifeFlight?

The Bundaberg chopper typically carries a pilot, a specialist aircrewman who runs the mission equipment and a Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) flight paramedic. Our primary role is to get the medical crew to and from the scene, wherever that may be, at any time of the day or night, sometimes negotiating the extremes of the weather.

Despite the damage 2020 has inflicted on Australia's arts industry, one Australian show can't wait to step into the spotlight this Christmas.



Have you experienced any scary moments?

For me, as a pilot, I enjoy doing this kind of stuff. I like being on the edge with that element of adrenaline. I always say, "the darker the night, the worse the weather, the better I like it", but there is prudence to this. It is my responsibility to ensure that I bring the aircraft back home safely. The heart rate goes up when we are operating at sea or conducting hoisting, especially at night. We don't take unnecessary risks in anything that we do. We identify the hazards for every mission, assess the risks and manage it well to achieve a safe outcome. We are well equipped and regularly undergo high levels of training to safely manage all situations.

Have you ever worked over Christmas, if so tell me a little about the experience?

All the time. I have been predominantly single all my life and never created a family. Even in the military years, I always volunteered to work during the holiday periods so those with families could go home.

What would you like the public to know over the holiday period, any safety message?

I would like everyone to think seriously about the risk that they may be taking by lighting that campfire or getting behind the wheel of a car. Think about and understand the consequences if something goes wrong: before it goes wrong. Be aware and manage the risk so you all stay safe. It doesn't mean you stop doing the things you love or having fun and enjoying yourself; after all, that's what life is about, but do it safely.

How does a successful rescue feel?

It is great when you know that you have contributed to a good outcome for a patient. It could be a 12-month-old baby or an 80-year-old. If you can create a better result for that person for whatever reason, it is amazingly satisfying. That is why we do it. We all feel very privileged to have the opportunity to provide this service. Most of us in this business are like that. We don't mind getting up at two in the morning to do a good deed.

MSHS Football Academy and Sunbury Football Club U13 players Jacob Darnell, Hudson Nitz and Jai Richter had a smashing season with their team to take out 2020 Fraser Coast Minor Premiers and Grand Final Winners, registering an undefeated season with a whopping 77 goals with Hudson conceding only 11 across the entire season. There is a lot to be celebrated in 2020 with our youth rising up and doing the Maryborough Community proud.

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

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

WHO ARE WE? BUCCANEERS!

At 4:30am on Saturday 7 November 2020, the Wide Bay Buccaneers players, coaches, and families loaded onto the bus for their very last journey to Brisbane. For three years this trip had become part of their lives. Young representative footballers who were so proud to represent their communities and chase their footballing dreams.

Hundreds of Wide Bay players had the opportunity to represent the Wide Bay in the Queensland Premier League and the National Premier League. As a result, Buccaneers players were selected for the Brisbane Roar Academy and Queensland Country representative sides

The BUCCS was established in 2017 and joined the Queensland Premier League in 2018 after receiving a 5-year licence from Football Queensland. But in January 2020, without warning or consultation, Football Queensland announced the Wide Bay Buccaneers would be removed from the competition at the end of the season. What took faithful coaches, managers and volunteers three years to build was decimated by a decision that still makes no sense to those involved.

For the last time, Tracie Cowie stood on the sideline waiting for that perfect picture. While she originally came to watch her son play as one of the junior goalkeepers in the first year, she quickly became the club photographer. She sacrificed watching her own son play, opting to make sure she captured every single player in action – precious memories for players and parents. It became part of the club culture for players to eagerly wait for Tuesday when the photos would be uploaded onto the club Facebook page, then share them on their own social media pages.

For the last time, Karen Smith made her way to the BUCCS bench with electrolyte ice blocks for each player. Players had travelled more than 4 hours to play a game of football and would soon be back on a bus to return home. She knew the importance of recovery and hydration for these players. Karen's son played for the Wide Bay Buccaneers since they began. While she first came to support her son, she connected with every player and was the driving force of the junior squads in their last year.

Isabel Quik is a mother of twins who played for the BUCCS. She first came to support her sons, but then started live-streaming the games so parents who couldn't travel were able to watch the games from home. For each away game Isabel would travel on the team bus and help look after the players, then taking over as the manager of the under 16s team for what would become their final year. As she walked off the field with the under 16 players, the sting was more than she had expected. The journey with the BUCCS had come to an end.

On Monday morning, Diane Patterson walked to her Hills Hoist to hang out the weekend washing. As she pegged a sea of blue, red, gold and black uniforms it occurred to her "this will be the very last time that I will be doing this". For the past three years Diane supported the BUCCS as a parent of one of the junior goalkeepers, but also as the team manager for the under 15s. It was not a nice feeling to think that the day before was the last game. It was all over. But why?


When Football Queensland explained the decision to withdraw the BUCCS' licence, it was because the program had not proven to be a success. But not one of the decision makers had spoken to a player, coach or parent before making their decision. If they did, perhaps they could have asked "how do you measure success?".

For the BUCCS coaches, players and parents, their measurement of success was based on experience, opportunity and growth. Developing the character of players and setting challenges that were always just beyond their reach.

At 4:00pm on 7 November 2020, the young BUCCS walked off the pitch for the last time, filled with gratitude towards people that made a difference in their lives. The true measurement of success.







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WITH ULF MALMROS

In what has been a tough year for many, Ulf Malmros and his family, wife Tina, and kids, Anna, Oscar, and Karl have forged ahead in life and business while growing in both strength and resilience.

The family took a moment to pause and reminisce about the early days, to reflect on the year that was, and to talk about the importance of giving back.

Born in Sweden in the '50s, Tina and Ulf fell in love and in 1979, shortly after tying the knot, the opportunity arose to move to France. The South West Bordeaux area became home, and over the years the Malmros family lived in various parts of France, staying in the country for twentyeight years

Ulf says, "Our first trip to France in 1979 gave us that sense of adventure and made us want to travel even more".

In 2001 the family took a holiday to Australia and were blown away by the country. It was at that point that the family decided to put plans into place to make Australia their new home. This dream came into fruition in 2007, carrying just two suitcases each, and having to leave everything else behind was not easy.

Ulf says, "The whole experience is much harder than you can imagine, you are leaving family, friends, and your culture behind. You also feel alone, which makes you question whether you have made the right decision.

"As a family, we had an agreement that if one of us didn't like it in Australia, we would all go back. We had our escape plan in place if things didn't work out"

The move was hard for the kids too. Karl says, "We lived in the South of France for pretty much all of our lives, so we had many friends that we had to leave behind.

"You can't replace friends; social media just isn't the same as physically seeing them. That was the hardest part, having to leave those people behind".

Tina says, "For me, it was probably easier as where I put my hat is my home. The first three months were the toughest because Ulf had to keep going back to France and the kids got jobs, I was very lonely here, but this was our new home, and I was determined to make the most of it". "It was a very tough decision to break up from family and friends. We also found the Australian language hard, as we only had basic English at the time", added Ulf

Due to Visa laws at the time, Ulf and Tina were only allowed to work if they bought or established their own business. So, a little Delicatessen called DeliBay was born. This turned out to be a big mistake, Ulf says, "we hadn't done our homework correctly, as there was no market for that type of business here".

But that didn't stop the Malmros family who decided to turn the Delicatessen into a café, and with many twists and turns along the way, the café eventually was renamed BeanBeat. The business grew from strength to strength and became bigger than the family needed. So, after shutting down the little hole in the wall that many people will remember, two shops remained one at Scarness and the other at Seafront. The business was then whittled down even further to make it more manageable, so the Scarness café was sold.

Ulf says, "our primary focus has always been about serving up delicious food and great coffee, but the most important of all to us was maintaining great Customer Service.

"The Seafront location had a facelift and has a lot more potential for us to grow into the future"

While many businesses were and are still struggling due to COVID, others like BeanBeat flourished.

Those who stayed open did a raging trade. People never give up their coffee.

Tina says, "It may sound strange, but I enjoyed this period, I was there every day helping out at front of house and offering a much-needed service, running in and out with coffee, spending precious moments with people who were feeling isolated".

Ulf has some very sound advice for those thinking of starting their own business. Ulf says, "Don't rush it, take your time, and do your homework, seek advice from an accountant or a business planner. Do not rely on your own judgement, at the time you are so enthusiastic that you won't see all of the mistakes that you can make, think it through first."

Over the years, the family have received a lot of help both in Australia and in France, Ulf considers it a privilege to give back to the community whenever he can, as does his family.

Some will remember Ulf when he was volunteering as a committee member with the Hervey Bay Chamber of Commerce, a role he held for three years and was very passionate about. Always on the lookout for other ways to volunteer within the community, he took his Swedish cast iron 25-kilo pushbike on the Esplanade and decided that he wanted to try to find something to do on the beach. So naturally, he ended up at the Hervey Bay Surf Club where club President Darren Everard convinced Ulf to join.

"Ulf says," He told me I was going to be a lifesaver, I had no idea at the time what a lifesaver was let alone what they did, but Darren quickly filled me in. He told me that they save lives, to which I responded, well I can hardly swim". The rest is history as Ulf became a fully-fledged member of the Hervey Bay Surf lifesaving Club and has never looked back since. He especially looks forward to Sunday's where the Nippers learn all about water safety, respect, and camaraderie. You can also find Ulf most Saturday afternoons volunteering behind the bar at the Hervey Bay Surf Lifesaving Club.

For the city as a whole Ulf says, "We hope that Hervey Bay remains the same place that it is today and that we don't have too much growth, we want growth, but it needs to be controlled, not like the French Riviera.

Ulf is always looking towards the future and appreciates every opportunity that comes his way. He is also passionate about his family.

With three grandchildren to keep him on his toe's life couldn't be any better. Ulf appreciates having his family around him and likes nothing more than to spend time with them.

Don't be socially isolated this Christmas

We are coming to the end of another year and WOW what a year it has been. One that we hope we never have to experience again.

Our world has changed, and many of these changes appear to be here to stay.

We are leading in to what is usually the busiest time of the year as family and friends come together to celebrate the festive season. Smiles, laughter, gifts and all things good are what we think off and hope for at this time of the year, but this is not the case for everyone.

Some people will be on their own with no one to share the joy. This month we will be looking at the issue of Social Isolation and what we can do as an individual or community to help reduce social isolation.

Social isolation - What is it, and who does it affect?

Social isolation is when someone has limited social connections. It is different to being lonely as you can have feelings of being lonely even though you are socially connected. Being socially isolated can, however, lead to loneliness and impacting other areas of your life such as your health.

There are many reasons as to why someone becomes socially isolated and include:

- · Geographical Isolation
- Health & Financial Reasons
- · Access to transport
- · Confidence Level
- Grief
- Domestic Violence/Elder Abuse
- · Lack of Feelings of Worth
- Age
- · Separation from family and friends

So, how do we reduce the issue of social isolation? The first and most important thing is to recognise it and then to talk about it. Reach out and ask for help, whether it be with a friend, family member, neighbour, your doctor, a professional, council or a local senior service.

The hardest thing is taking that first step so be brave pick up the phone or visit one of the above and ask for help to get connected.

Fraser Coast residents are luckier than most as there is a wide variety of ways to connect and stay connected. This includes interest groups, counsellors, financial assistance, transport assistance and social support.

To feel that you are a part of your local community can be as simple as joining a group to satisfy your interests or for some they will take on greater roles such as volunteering for a local organisation and even becoming involved from a management perspective.



I guess that for some of you reading this article you are saying to yourself – it sounds good on paper, but it is all too hard and scary.

I agree that YES, it is hard and scary, but it doesn't have to be 'TOO' hard. Taking that first step is the hardest, but for some, it will be the most important step that you will take. To start your journey to reduce your isolation, there are many people out there who can help. If it is not someone you know, it may be a local organisation that can help you.

HOW CAN WE LEARN ABOUT THE STORIES K'GARI HAS TO TELL?

Apart from a tourist perspective and the kilometres of pristine beaches everyone loves, there are also many past industrial uses, significant unusual geological features and a unique ecology system that forms part of the island. Art has its own unique way of telling these stories in a visual way that opens a dialogue for the viewer and can have a profound effect on the way we observe nature and past histories.

Heart of K'gari, features nine diverse, Fraser Coast, visual artists who will be using their own personal responses of time spent on the island to express their feelings and tell some of the stories using a multitude of media and mediums.

There are works on the past logging industry, the disintegrating Maheno wreck. The feelings evoked from the many textures in the natural environment and some of the birds seen across the island.

In this current climate, with Covid and a need to remain in our own backyard for holidays, it is particularly poignant that we can use this time to highlight the importance of how we see and enjoy K'gari and have a deeper meaning and understanding of it's worth.

The Artists, Georgie Dee, Gina Davey, Belinda Green, Sarah Cooper, David Probyn, John Purnell, Leticia Pujol, Susan Standley, Valerie McIntosh, each with their own profession arts practice, have banded together to collaborate in this exhibition in their own unique way. Through shared memories and individual experiences, Heart of K'gari has come together over the past year and promises nine different perspectives. From large scale acrylic works to small, postcard-like paintings of tourist hot spots, encaustic, sculpture, digital, watercolour and oil, there will be something for everyone to enjoy and relate to.

Contemporary artist, Sarah Cooper, is known for her vibrant paintings and loves to experiment with the pouring medium and use it in unusual ways to push the boundaries of the medium. She is also working in acrylic. Gina Davey combines her love of oil and charcoal painting with her passion for sculpture to tell a story, usually of global concerns. While Georgie Dee works in a variety of media including digital, quite often with an underlying religious theme and a deeper, thought- provoking meaning.

Mixed media artist Belinda Green, who's quirky style always engages viewers on an emotional level, will be bringing a contemporary feel to the exhibition.

Valerie McIntosh is an avid and experienced print maker who is also using a caustic wax in this exhibition for her body of work. Val is well known as a respected art teacher and exhibitor, realist and surrealist artist. David Probyn has an ongoing love of pastel and acrylic and is including an assemblage piece that's sure to bring back memories to many, from visits to the island.

Leticia Pujol uses a meditative process to create her work before production begins using various mediums. Her lively Latin cultural background guarantees her work has a vibrant, unmistakable quality that is uniquely hers.

Much loved, Hervey Bay artist, John Purnell, is using his favourite medium, pastel, to bring us a series of land and seascapes while Susan Standley embraces her love of abstraction and colour fields inspired by forms and surfaces, to share her personal experiences, in her work.

The "Heart of K'gari" exhibition will be on show at Gatakers Artspace from the 5th Dec to 17th Jan, in Gallery 1 & 2 and will run in conjunction with two other, not to be missed exhibitions, in the upstairs space. "Elemental Forces" by Sue McLean and "A Bird Memoir" by Gavin Paterson.

Gatakers sits in the heart of the Heritage Precinct of Maryborough at 311 Kent Street and makes for a wonderful day out visiting the museums and cafe that front the Mary River.

garlic into the scored diamond ends. Bake for a further 30 minutes until you have that golden look. Then caramelise by brushing ham unit you have that golden look. Then carametise by brushing harfi with the the remainder of the glaze and bake for another 20 minutes.

Or you could try a Pineapple Mustard Glaze, using the same method, vegetable dish or salad. all you need is:

1/2 cup of Pineapple Jam 1/4 cup Dijon Mustard 1/4 cup of packed brown sugar



Tell us a little about your background?

I've always been an animal lover. I was that crazy young girl who was always taking the stray animal's home, I also lived and breathed horses. I spent all my time on weekends helping friends on their farms just to be near animals. As we travelled a lot when I was younger, I struggled to make close friends but always had a strong bond with animals. I spent my early twenties volunteering abroad with exotic animals and knew in my soul that I needed a career that involved animals.

Where did your interest in camels stem from?

I have always been fascinated with camels (So unique!), when I was on a road trip through the NT, I had the opportunity to spend time with made it my mission. I was fortunate to have met Lionel from Southern Cross Camels who mentored me and introduced me to the wonderful world of camels

What makes camels such a unique animal?

I love to share the camels with everyone as it gives people a chance to see their true beauty. Most people are so surprised at how incredibly gentle they can be. I think in the past they have been a very misunderstood animal; I remember that the documentaries I watched growing up always just showed a bull in rut - which isn't a very flattering picture of a camel. The public is led to believe they are all stinky, spitting aggressive beasts when in fact, they are beautiful, smart creatures and very sensitive, they have very strong bonds between

them and remember everything. They teach you a lot about yourself, as you need patience and respect to work with them. Once you've built a mutually respectful relationship with a camel, it creates such a strong bond, nothing can compare to the love and admiration you have for them

in their own way.

"Masai" - my lead camel is a big gentle giant and is truly the love of my life. He is the most mature of the camels, and at home, on the farm, he is the protector of them all and makes sure each of the camels are treating each other fairly. Masai was originally a wild camel in SA who spent some time in a zoo down there before relocating to QLD.

"Spydey" - is my goofball who is a happy chap and always happy to see everyone he is very "talkative" when it comes to feed time or when he knows there is a carrot nearby. He is perfect for children to spend time with as he has such a beautiful, friendly nature. Spydey was an orphaned camel who was destined to be slaughtered, but luckily, we were given the opportunity to adopt him at a few days old.

"Queen Latifah" is a gorgeous big lady. A retired racing camel, she likes to spend her days "being aunty" to the younger camels. Queen is a great camel to take to the beach and has been a wonderful companion on trekking adventures.

"Rex" is also a retired racing camel and came from the same property out west as "Queen". He is a calm, sensitive camel who learns very quickly and prefers to be around gentle people. It took a long time to earn his trust, so it was extremely rewarding, as he is a very special part of our camel family.

What is their environment like at home?

When the camels are at home, they have access to over 80 acres where they spend their time browsing, relaxing, and having sand baths in their many sandpits. They have access to two large ponds and enjoy splashing around in there. Each morning and evening, we spend time with them. Watching the sunset surrounded by camels is a very special experience!

Why do you think that people enjoy camel rides as a pose to horse riding?

They are both such different experiences that I think it's impossible to compare! Our camels live with our horses, and we love to ride them both. The camels are very much, in my opinion, a calmer, relaxed ride. There's a saying - "you should experience life at the pace of a camel", basically, it's nice to slow down and be grateful for the blessings already in your life. This is so important in today's modern world.


